The Frank Wilson/Link Farm property is a remarkably intact late 19th century farmstead located on a rolling hillside overlooking the Patuxent River. The farmstead is accessed by a winding one-lane rural road and comprises a ca. 1894 gable front and wing Queen Anne style main house and 8 period outbuildings. The resource is one of Eastern Montgomery County's most significant late 19th century farmsteads. It includes both the buildings designed for living and those that made up the architecture of agriculture for a general farm in the period 1894-1944. The farmhouse, barn, and outbuildings with the adjoining yards, garden and roadway, are intact and reflect the county's rural lifestyle in the late 19th century and the functional importance of outbuildings needed for self-supporting domestic and farm-related chores in this period. Although the Wilson House/Link Farm has had minor alterations and additions, it retains a high degree of integrity and represents a distinctive example of a once common farmhouse complex.

The Frank Wilson property is a remarkably intact late nineteenth century farmstead located on a rolling hillside overlooking the Patuxent River (Rocky Gorge Reservoir). The farmstead is accessed by a winding one-lane rural road (Link Road) and comprises a ca. 1894 gable front and wing Oueen Anne style main house and eight period outbuildings.

Main House

The Wilson House is a two-story frame gable front and wing building with clapboard walls and a moderate pitched roof covered by metal shingles. The two-story building has a general overall L-plan with a gable and wing core built ca. 1894 with a rear ell that was originally a double-pen log house constructed ca. 1865. The principle elevation of the house faces southwest overlooking a gentle sloping yard and the curvilinear drive that becomes Link Road.

The front of the building has a three-bay facade with a symmetrical rank of two-over-two windows on the second story. The first level has a simple side entry with spindlework screen door and two-over-two window. A one story hipped roofed, L-shaped porch, supported by simple posts ornamented with scrollwork brackets, wraps around the building's south and west elevations. A projecting oriel window with three fixed six pane windows has been added to a porch infill on the main facade's first level, which also has a simple entry off the porch.

The remaining facades of the house also have two-over-two sash windows placed in largely symmetrical ranks throughout the building with a few one-over-one and six-over-six windows added to the one story shed addition to the rear and the irregularly shaped aluminum sided one and two story extensions on the east facade. Smaller square windows light the attic level at each gable end.

Chicken Coop

South of the main house is a one story, rectangular board and batten chicken house with a shed roof (ca. 1894).

8 Significance

Level of Significance: national state local

Summary: The Frank Wilson property is one of Eastern Montgomery County's most significant late nineteenth century farmsteads. It comprises both the buildings designed for living and those that made up the architecture of agriculture for a general farm in the period 1894-1944. The farmhouse, barn, and outbuildings with the adjoining yards, garden and roadway, the center of farm life, are intact at the Wilson property and reflect the county's rural lifeways in the late nineteenth century and the functional importance of outbuildings and appendages needed for self-supporting domestic and farm-related chores in this period. Although the Wilson House has had minor alterations and additions, it retains a high degree of integrity of location, setting, form, plan, and materials and represents a distinctive example of a once common farmhouse complex in eastern Montgomery County.

A house was probably constructed on the farm around 1837 by Frank Wilson who settled along the Patuxent River at this time. Family tradition holds that this building was erected on what is now the adjacent Bonifant farm and was demolished at sometime in the mid-nineteenth century. The rear ell of the existing house is a double pen log structure erected by Wilson at sometime prior to 1865. This structure was incorporated into an ca. 1894 remodeling and addition of a gable front and wing frame house. 1

As a measure of their ambition and growing prosperity by the late nineteenth century, the Wilsons erected a Queen Anne gable front and wing house that subsumed the old log farmhouse. Machine-worked

Smokehouse

Just to the northwest of the main house is a one-story gable end rectangular board and batten smokehouse (ca. 1894).

Garage/Shed

A gable end rectangular garage/shed with a shed roof addition was erected in the 1920s. It is located just to the northwest of the smokehouse.

Corncrib

This corncrib (ca. 1894) is a gable end rectangular structure covered by a metal roof and sided with slats spaced for ventilation. A hinged gable end door allowed entrance to the crib.

Wagon Shed

A wide one story frame wagon shed (ca. 1894) with three bays and a side wheat bin is located to the southwest of the house. The board and batten structure has a raised tin shed roof with a pent roof built over the wagon bays to create loft space to store implements and tack.

Barn

A gable end single crib barn (ca. 1894) with one side bay used as wagon or harness shed is located to south of main house. The structure has a hand hewn log frame, board and batten siding and a raised tin roof.

Cow Shed

A deteriorated cowshed (ca. 1894) is located just south of the barn. The structure is crude lumber nailed to a framework of sapling poles covered with a raised tin shed roof.

Pigpen

A deteriorated pigpen (ca. 1894) is located just to the west of the barn. The structure is crude lumber nailed to a framework of sapling poles covered with a raised tin shed roof.

balloon framing, window sash, flooring and joinery are evident reflecting the increasing abundance and widespread distribution of building materials and mechanization of the building process in the county by this time. 2

The Wilson family owned large farms in both Montgomery and Howard counties and were prominent in the county's social and economic affairs. During the twentieth century the ca. 1894 Frank Wilson house became a "starter" home for the family's young couples or was leased to tenants. Ruth and Clifton Link, the current owners of the farmhouse and immediate surrounding acreage, are the descendants of the Frank Wilson. They recalled that the property during the first half of the twentieth century was a general farming operation that produced crops of corn, potatoes, hay, wheat and had a few dairy cows. When the Washington Sanitary Suburban Commission began to acquire land for the preservation of the watershed for its Patuxent River Filtration Plant in the 1940s, the agency acquired over one hundred and forty acres of the farm that fronted the river. After this reduction in acreage Clifton Link, Sr. converted the property into a truck farm and raised turkeys, chickens, and guinea hens. 3

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
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
