The present church building, erected in 1907, is a one-story, two-bay, rectangular frame structure with a front-gabled, asphalt-shingled roof and a slightly-projecting entrance tower in the southwest bay; the tower has a small pointed-arch stained glass window on its south elevation, at ground-floor level. A steeple with an open belfry caps the tower. The vertically-sided belfry features a railing with turned balusters, bracketed corners, and a modillioned cornice. The church foundation, originally of stone, is now stuccoed concrete block. A small cemetery is located at the rear of the church.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The present church building, erected in 1907, is a one-story, two-bay, rectangular frame structure with a front-gabled, asphalt-shingled roof and a slightly-projecting entrance tower in the southwest bay; the tower has a small pointed-arch stained glass window on its south elevation, at ground-floor level. A steeple with an open belfry caps the tower. The vertically-sided belfry features a railing with turned balusters, bracketed corners, and a modillioned cornice. The church foundation (originally of stone, before the excavation of the basement) is now stuccoed concrete block.

The main (west) facade of the church features a large pointed-arch stained glass tracery window with three lancet-like lights. The gable end is covered with decorative shingles which extend across the corner tower, above the stained glass window in the entranceway. Concrete steps lead to the church entrance, which consists of double paneled doors capped by a pointed-arched window with the words "Salem M.E. Church" in stained glass. A cornerstone at the northwest corner of the church building is inscribed: "Salem M.E. Church 1907".

The north elevation has four narrow pointed-arch stained glass windows with illustrations from the Bible; three of four similar windows on the south elevation are obscured on the exterior by the wing which serves as a social hall; they are visible, however, from the interior of the church.

The rear elevation of the church features a one-story semi-hexagonal apse with small pointed-arch stained glass windows on its north and south elevations. Above the apse is a stained glass compass window. There is an entrance at the northeast corner of the rear elevation.

The four-bay, side-gabled addition on the south elevation of the church, erected in 1937, is used as a social hall; it has a metal roof and six/six windows. Entrance is in the northernmost bay of the west facade, with an additional basement entrance in the southernmost bay of the east facade. Aluminum-clad, it is a simple structure which is architecturally compatible with the church.

The interior of the sanctuary is simple, the only decorative elements being the wainscoting extending around the room and the stained glass windows. The original pressed-metal ceiling is still in place but is covered with modern tiles. The communion railing has turned balusters.

Two sets of paneled doors lead from the sanctuary to the social hall and the entrance vestibule.

A small cemetery is located at the rear of the church.

Except for the addition of the social hall in the 1930s and aluminum siding in the 1960s, there have been no major alteration to the exterior of the church. A wooden entrance railing was replaced by a metal one and the original wooden entrance steps and porch are now concrete. The entranceway was altered to include the stained glass window where there was originally only a taller door. In addition, the church basement was dug out in 1954 for classroom use and a basement entrance added at the northwest corner of the church, below ground level. In spite of these modifications, the structure has retained its original form and remains an excellent example of an early twentieth century rural vernacular church building.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Salem United Methodist Church in Cedar Grove is historically significant as part of the development of the county's religious institutions in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries and architecturally significant as a well-preserved example of an early twentieth century rural church.

With the disestablishment of the Anglican Church in America after the Revolution, the number of Methodists in Montgomery County increased rapidly:

"The beginnings were simple, with itinerant preachers meeting their congregations in homes, tobacco houses, and barns...permanent meeting houses were built in the County by the 1780's."(1)

In the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries, Methodist strength was concentrated largely in the northwestern section of the county, although a Methodist Church existed in Rockville before 1801 and Federal Chapel, near Colesville, was built in the late eighteenth century. Goshen Chapel near Laytonsville and Bennetts Chapel (also known as Sugar Loaf Chapel) were early centers of Methodism. The number of Methodists grew steadily through the nineteenth century until a majority of the county's residents were of that faith. Between 1870 and 1910, two-thirds of all the new congregations organized in Montgomery County were Methodist. (2)

The beginnings of Salem United Methodist Church are uncertain, since early church records were destroyed in a farmhouse fire in the 1800s; Montgomery County Methodist Church Circuit Records for the years prior to 1857 were also lost. (3) According to church legend, however, there was a group of Methodist worshippers in Cedar Grove in the late 1700s. Church records clearly establish a Methodist congregation there by 1857, when Salem was one of eight Methodist churches in the county filing for a Certificate of Incorporation.

Salem's changing status over the years illustrates the Methodist Church's growth in the county. Originally part of what was known as the "Montgomery County Circuit" (formed in 1788 from the Frederick County Circuit) Salem became part of the new Laytonsville Circuit (created by taking the Laytonsville and Mt. Tabor churches from the Rockville Circuit and the Wesley Grove, Salem and Damascus churches from the Montgomery Circuit) in 1890. "Circuits" consisted of several churches sharing an itinerant minister and, sometimes, a parsonage. The parsonage for the Laytonsville Circuit was located in Laytonsville and ministers stayed with parishioners while preaching in Cedar Grove.

Meeting at first in homes and later in the original Cedar Grove school, the Salem congregation was given 3 / $_{5}$ of an acre by Hezekiah Barber in 1869 for the erection of its first church, a log structure. It stood just north of the present church building on the site now occupied by a swimming pool company and is shown on the Hopkins <u>Atlas</u> for 1878. $^{(4)}$ (5) The foundation of the original church remained until the 1930s. Additional land for a cemetery (75 square perches) was donated in 1906 by Joseph and Harriet Sibley. $^{(6)}$

During the Civil War years, dissension in the Methodist Church over the issue of slavery resulted in the formation, in some places, of proand anti-slavery congregations. Both the Clarksburg and Hyattstown churches split over the issue and separate Methodist Episcopal Churches, South, were built in those communities; Salem, however, was not affected by the divisions caused by the war.

In 1923, in response to continued growth, the Laytonsville Circuit was divided and Damascus and Salem became a separate "Damascus Charge", sharing a minister and a parsonage; the parsonage was erected on Rockville Pike, one mile south of Damascus. In 1951, with increased congregational growth, Damascus Methodist and Salem Methodist became separate "church stations", each with its own minister. Salem built a new parsonage on $^{1}/_{2}$ acre of land donated by the Watkins and Nehouse families; it is located just north of the present church on the west side of Ridge Road. $^{(7)}$

Originally called the Salem Methodist Episcopal Church, the word "Episcopal" was dropped in 1939 when the three divisions of American Methodism (Methodist Episcopal Church, Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and Methodist Protestant Church) joined to become the Methodist Church. In 1969, the name was changed to Salem United Methodist to reflect the merger of the Methodist and Evangelical United Brethren churches.

The existing Salem Church building was erected in 1907. Simple in design, it reflects the influence of the architectural pattern books assembled by the Carpenters' Company of Philadelphia in the mid-late 1700s; the collection included material on the popular British church styles of the period, with their steeples and porticos:

"A basic pattern for churches was established by (British architect) James Gibbs, who, in his publication A Book of Architecture (1728) popularized the steepled and porticoed churches designed by Sir Christopher Wren, architect of St. Paul's Cathedral in London. Gibb's book not only made the spire and the belfry reaching toward heaven ubiquitous in the eighteenth century, it also had a lasting influence into the twentieth century."(7)

The Salem Church, in a much-simplified form, is an adaptation of the ecclesiastical style popularized by Wren and later imported to the American colonies. As such, it is an authentic example of an early vernacular church building of the type which is now being replaced (as rural development continues) by larger "colonial" or "contemporary" structures.

The facade has a pointed arched window with three lancet-like lights. Along the side walls are four, pointed-arched windows. The apse is semi-hexagonal.


The siding has been replaced with aluminum siding.


There are a number of notable late 19th - early 20th.C. houses lining Rt.27 here, particularly north of the church.
