DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The church appeared in present form in a photo dated 1916, 3 bays in length with the entrance in the east gable facade. However, this door was originally in the 2-story tower, set in the southeast corner, and the present windows were arched in style. The building has been extended to the rear.

This four bay by six bay, one and a half story church sits on a hill

facing east.

Built on fieldstone foundations, the exterior walls are covered with white pebble dash. The church has several parts: The east-west section, the southeast corner tower, the north-south wing at the north-west corner, and the two bay, north-south wing at the northeast corner. At the south-east corner of the east elevation there is a two-story tower with a pyramidal roof. At the first level, east and south elevations, there are paired four light casement windows surmounted by a two light transom. At the second level, east, and south elevations, there are large round-headed louvered windows set into a slightly recessed round-headed arch. On the east elevation, near the south corner there are double wooden paneled doors set into a wooden paneled recess. The east door is defined by a recessed Gothic archway on the east elevation. Flanking the door and contained within the arch are two lancet stained glass windows. There is door to the northeast wing, this is wooden paneled.

door to the northeast wing, this is wooden paneled.

There are paired four light casement windows surmounted by two light transoms. On the south and west elevations there are picture windows flanked by four light casement windows and surmounted by three transoms.

The church has intersecting gable roofs covered by slate shingles. The east gable end has a boxed pediment with a single king post truss visible as half timbered construction.

The cemetery is organized mainly in family plots, totalling more than 300 burials. There is no fencing to define the area.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Mt. Zion Baptist Church represents the missionary goal of the Baptist Church to establish new churches in the small communities of rural 19th century Maryland. The sole survivor of the tiny community of "Rabbitt's P.O." or "Beane", although not in its original building, Mt. Zion continues to play an active role in its community as it did at its founding in 1862.

The church's history began in 1821 when 8 members of the Old Seneca Baptist Church (also known as Upper Seneca) applied for "dismission" and resolved to start a new church to be known as The Bethel Baptist Church of Montgomery County. In 1822 Bethel Baptist Church applied for membership in the Baltimore Association and by 1828 it had the members who met in various private homes. Bethel Baptist Church divided into two groups in

31, one retaining the name Bethel and the other taking the name Rockville Baptist Church or The Baptist Church at Rockville. 3 Church records refer to a meeting held on September 13, 1856, in the grove of O.S. Wilson on Georgetown Road and to several meetings held at the Magruder School House at Bean in 1858. 4 At these meetings, the need for a permanent meeting house was recognized and to this end Elizabeth and John G. Bohrmr, in 1859, conveyed "a tract of land called Tryal....whereon to erect a meeting house for the purpose of religious worship; and as a burying ground for the members of said church". 5 This land had been in the Bohrer family since 1829 when Jacob Bohrer had purchased "Tryal" from Thaddeus White. 6

The cornerstone for the first meeting house was laid in 1862 on what was locally known as "Spider Hill". The building was a frame structure, 30 by 40 feet, costing \$1600, and had a gallery in the rear for members' slaves.

The location of the meeting house is indicated as "Baptist Church" on the 1865 Martinet and Bond Map of Montgomery County and appears again in the same location on the G.M. Hopkins Maps of 1878 and 1894, as "Mount Zion Baptist Church" and "Mt. Zion Baptist Church", respectively.

Research on Civil War activity in the neighborhood of the church was published in "The Rambler" in October 15, 1916, edition of The Sunday Star. It states that on July 10, 1864,

...a brigade of calvary, the 2nd Massachusetts and the 10th New York, numbering 800 effectives and commanded by Col. C.R. Lowell, was camped near Falls Church, Va. This force was called to the defense of Washington, and it was this force or a part of it which struck Early's advance near Rabbitts Branch. 12

The specific location of this military action in further described as being near Rabbitts Branch which flows through an area whose principal land-marks were "a store kept by Isaac O. Rabbitt, [and] Mt. Zion Baptist Church, CONTINUE ON SEPARATE SHEET IF NECESSARY or "Spider Hill Church". 13

Church tradition holds that in July 1864, some of General Jubal Early's troops were quartered in the church, and that they engaged in a skirmish nearby Col. C.R. Lowell, whose brigade was defending the capital.

The church on Spider Hill survived the Civil War, and in 1868 incorporated as the Baptist Church at Rockville.

The church grew at such a rate that in December, 1880, thirteen members were granted letters of dismission to organize Mt. Zion Baptist Church, and soon fourteen more members joined them 16 In February, 1883, "Mt. Zion Baptist Church" formed a separate church organization; the deacons of the Baptist Church at Rockville gave the property (the same property purchased in 1859 from the Bohrers) to the deacons of the Mt. Zion Baptist Church. \mathcal{U}

Mt. Zion continued to play a central role in the community throughout the remainder of the 19th century and into the 20th. Requiring a larger place of worship reflecting a growth in the local population, a new sanctuary was built in 1910. This was remodeled in 1950 and an educational wing was added to the north end. 18 In 1932 the Parsonage was built and in 1960 it was enlarged. 19 larged. 19 By 1962 at the Church's 100th anniversary, the membership had grown to about 600 members and the C.A. Brubaker Educational Building was opened. 20

Continuing the mission of the Baptist Church, Mt. Zion helped establish a new church at Travilah around 1894,21 and the Montrose Baptist Church in

the 1950s,22

The cemetery at Mt. Zion contains several hundred grave sites dating from about 1864 to the present. Many of the old local families such as the Beanes. agruders, Veirs, Darcys and Rileys have members buried here. Newer families epresented include that of Dorée Germaine Holman (1890-1975), historian of Bethesda area. The cemetery has been in continuous use, functioning as L link for the present members with those long dead who witnessed the inception and growth of this community landmark.

Mt. Zion Baptist Church is commonly known as "The Church in the Wildwood". and the neighboring Wildwood shopping center and surrounding Wildwood Manor residential area take their names from this.
