The house known as the Gaither/Howard house, originally built in 1790, is located on a 75-acre parcel of land in the Patuxent River State Park on the North side of Damascus Road in rural northern Montgomery County. The property includes a primary residence, two oubuildings, a second stone residence, and a cemetery. The buildings are in severe runious condition. Beale Gaither, in 1790, was the builder of the 1-1/2 story, stone dwelling. The Gaither-Howard house came to include a 2-1/2 story, I-house addition, a 2-1/2 story, one-room frame extension and a one-story, one-room frame extension. Enoch George Howard, a freed black, after whom the property is also named, purchased it from the Gaither family in 1862. The Howard family retained ownership for 98 years. The property provides an illustration of the evolution of rural domestic building in Montgomery County and provides a historical link to two notable families in the county. Due to the severe deterioration, the Gaither-Howard houses and their outbuildings do not meet the Criteria in the Maryland Inventory of Historic Properties.

The house known as the Gaither/Howard House, originally built in 1790,¹ is located on a 75-acre parcel of land in the Patuxent River State Park. The property includes a primary residence, two oubuildings, a second stone residence with a single outbuilding, and a cemetery. The buildings are in severe runious condition.

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

The primary residence--a 2-1/2 story stone I-house with a frame extension and a stone/frame rear ell--was built in four parts. The original section of the house, now the mid-section of the rear ell, was built in 1790 as a 1-1/2 story stone dwelling with a stone chimney. The house was enlarged by the addition of the stone Ihouse, now forming the main block. A frame, 2-1/2 story extension to the I-house was probably added in conjunction with the frame extension to the rear ell.

Exterior Description:

I-House:

Set upon a stone foundation, the 2-1/2 story stone structure is covered with a gable roof. The roof, sheathed with wood shingles and covered with standing seam metal, features one brick interior end chimney. A five-bay porch extends across the front elevation of the house.

The principal (south) elevation consists of an early 19th century stone structure and a mid-19th century frame extension. The stone structure includes the west, three bays, while the extension includes the east, three bays. The three-bay, west section consists of a central passage and flanking windows on the first story and three, symmetrical windows on the second story.

The three-bay, frame extension has a central entry and flanking windows on the first story and a single window located in the center bay of the second story. A brick chimney, located between these two blocks, was originally an interior end chimney for the stone structure. A single-story shed roof porch extends across the entire south elevation. It is set upon a stone foundation and has seven square columns.

The north elevation of the stone I-house addition contains a sideentry in the east bay of the first story and two, symmetrically-

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placed windows in the second story. A single-story shed-roof porch extends across the north elevation of the stone structure. It is set upon a stone foundation and has three square columns.

The north elevation of the three-bay, frame extension's first and second story each have a window in the central bay.

The west elevation of the stone, I-house addition is one-room deep. The first and second story each have windows located in the rear bay. The third story has a small window located in the front bay.

The east elevation of the stone I-house addition is only slightly visible on the third story, where part of a small window is visible in the gable. The rest of the east elevation is covered by the addition of the frame extension. The east elevation of the frame extension is one-room deep. The first and second story each have windows located in the rear bay. The third story has a small window located in the front bay.

Rear ell:

The 1-1/2 story rear ell consists of the original 1790 stone structure and a mid-19th century one-story frame extension. The two-bay stone structure is set upon a stone foundation and is covered with a gable roof. The roof, sheathed in wood shingles and covered in standing seam metal, features a large stone exterior end chimney. The one-bay frame extension is clad with board and batten and is covered with a simple shed roof. The roof is sheathed with standing seam metal. This extension was probably added around the same time that the frame extension to this I-house was built.

The west elevation of the stone dwelling includes the inside, two bays of the ell, while the extension includes the one end bay. The first and second floor of the original dwelling's west elevation consists of one window in the back bay. The frame extension has a single window is centrally placed on this facade. The massive chimney, located between these two blocks, was originally an exterior end chimney for the 1-1/2 story stone dwelling.

The first floor of the stone structure's east elevation is not visible due to a one-story shed roof porch that extends across the elevation. This porch is in ruins, blocking the view of this floor. The second floor of the stone structure's east elevation has a single centrally placed window.

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Second Stone Dwelling (Howard House #2):

Howard House #2 is located NE of the Gaither/Howard House. This house is in very ruinous condition. The following is a description completed in 1979 by Bridget Deale:

This stone house is two stories with a single-story ell projecting from the rear (west) facade. A two-story frame section has been annexed to the north gable end. The main section has a three-bay east facade with a central doorway opening into the south room. A one-story screened porch spans this facade. Interior brick chimneys are located in both gable walls. The ell, which appears to have been constructed at the same time, has a two-bay south facade with a semi-external stone chimney on the west gable end.

In plan, the main section has two rooms on the first floor. Although mantels have been grossly vandalized, the pressed tin ceiling with a fleur-de-lis tin cornice still remains in the south room. This room also contained a boxed, corner staircase to the second floor. The second floor plan has an L-shaped hall, running along the south and west walls with three small rooms opening from it. The partition walls are frame, with vertical board sheathing. On both floors the major walls are plastered.

The rear ell is a single room with a large hearth with a wooden lintel spanning the opening; the present shelf is supported by brackets. The corner cupboard and the boxed staircase on the opposite wall both have narrow vertical beaded board sheathing. In the loft, there are small windows very close to the floor on the north and south walls. Window frames on both floors are beaded boards.

To the west of the kitchen wing, a second summer kitchen exists. This area, which is essentially a screened porch is accessible from both the main kitchen and the outside.

The frame addition to the north is two stories tall, one room up and one room down. It does not connect with the stone section on either floor. The frame section has been covered with asbestos shingles.

All three sections have standing seam tin roofs.

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Outbuildings for the Gaither-Howard House:

Outbuilding #2: This outbuilding is located to the north of the main house. The structure is in severe ruinous condition. It is thought that this building might have been a corn crib at one time, but the severe deterioration of the structure makes it difficult to determine.

Outbuilding #3: This outbuilding is located north of outbuilding #2. The only remaining portion of this structure is the stone foundation.

Outbuilding for the Howard House #2:

Outbuilding #1: This outbuilding is located west of the house. The structure is a simple frame outbuilding sheathed in vertical wood plank siding and covered with a gable roof sheathed in metal. The two openings are located in the gable end measuring 5' by 3'.

<u>Cemetery:</u>

The burial plot for the Howard house lies north of the Gaither Howard house.

The site has been maintained over the years. The tombstones are in good condition and a contemporary wood and wire fence has been placed to protect it from the cultivated fields that surround the site.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Gaither-Howard houses are located in the Patuxent River State Park on the north side of Damascus Road in rural northern Montgomery County. <u>Historic Context:</u>

This parcel of land was the original land tract called patented by Benjamin Gaither, as "Gaither's Forest."³ The original stone house was built in 1790 by Beale Gaither. Mr. Gaither is listed in the 1783 tax assessment as a farmer and owning property on a tract of land known as Mount Calvary. Beale Gaither died in 1839 and left his estate to his nephew Samuel R. Gaither. "To my nephew Samuel R. Gaither, I leave my dwelling plantation...and I give and devise my dwelling plantation...to my brother Frederick...after the death of my nephew Samuel R."⁴ Samuel R. Gaither did not die until August 17, 1860---but for whatever reason, Frederick Gaither obtained his brother's estate.⁵

Frederick Gaither died in 1843 and he left his estate to his "daughter Maria, wife of Samuel R. Gaither, the farm willed by Beale Gaither to him the Samuel R. in the event of his death..." After his death and that of his wife, the property was to be equally divided among the "daughters of my daughters Martha and Elizabeth Griffith and Rebecca Warfield and daughters of my son

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Perry..."6

In 1857, a slave and field foreman of the Gaither Family, Enoch George Howard bought freedom for himself and his wife Harriet, with \$3,000 of his savings, obtained from selling produce he cultivated from a small plot of land given to him by his original owner Beale Gaither.⁷

In March of 1860, Harriet, Enoch George Howard's wife, bought their five children from Samuel R. Gaither, (Greenbury, John, Mary, Alice, Maria, and Martha).⁸

In August of 1862, Enoch George Howard purchased the Gaither-Howard house and 289.5 acres from Frederick Gaither's grandchildren.⁹ Enoch George Howard prospered as a farmer and landowner, acquiring a total of 600 acres of land during his lifetime.¹⁰

In 1885, Enoch George Howard sold the house and 289.5 acres of land to his son, Greenbury. "Being part of the same land conveyed by Maria G. Griffith and others to George..."¹¹

(It is thought that this is when Greenbury Howard built Howard House #2.)

On January 14, 1895, Enoch George Howard died. The *Montgomery County Sentinel* stated upon his death that "he was an old and highly respected citizen." He had given land to found Howard Chapel (M23-11) and to establish a black school (built prior to 1879)¹² which was located on the east side of Howard Chapel Road

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south of the church.¹³

Enoch George Howard's estate was divided equally among his five children, (Greenbury, John, Mary Alice, Maria and Martha).¹⁴ In the next seven years, Greenbury Howard bought his sister Maria and Martha's portion of the estate.¹⁵

In 1927, Greenbury Howard died. He left his 300-acre estate to be divided between his wife, Mary M. Howard (100 acres), his sons, George Samuel and Daniel H. (199.5 acres), and a 1/2-acre of land to be used as a family burial ground.¹⁶ This is the present-day cemetery located on the site.

On January 19, 1960, Mary M. Howard and her sons sold their property and the 299.5 acres to Thomas Blair and Mary Virginia Middleton.¹⁷ Nine years later, Mr. Blair and Mrs. Middleton sold 200 acres of the 299.5 acres to the Maryland Department of Natural Resources(present owners) to be part of the Patuxent River State Park.¹⁸

The houses are both of stone construction. The north structure is probably older. It is two stories with a three bay main (south) facade. The central doorway is flanked by large windows; on the second floor are two smaller windows. To the north is a story and a half stone ell with dormer windows on both slopes of the roof. In plan, the house has two rooms on the main floor. The doorway is in the east room and the boxed stairs rise between the two rooms; triangular treads at the beginning of the straight run give access to the stairs from both rooms. The walls are plastered, with split lath over the studding. The chair rail is a beaded board capped by an ogee moulding. Door and window jambs are splayed and panelled. The second floor has a hallway with rooms opening on either side and with a doorway to the loft of the rear wing, The hall partition walls are vertical beaded boards with applied quarter round mouldings around the door openings. The hall has an alcove at the south end, where the stairs rise to the attic. The attic has rafter joists mortised, tenoned, and pegged at the ridge with collars half-lapped and nailed over pairs of rafters. At the lower end, a nailer supports the rafters.

The rear wing is a single room with a fireplace on the north wall. The opening has a stone lining. On either side of the fireplace are cabinets with moulded surrounds. The room is plastered over sawn lath. There is no direct access of the loft above.

The south house is two stories with a story and a half stone ell and a two-story frame section on the east end. The main section has a three bay south facade with a central doorway opening into the west room. At either end there are flush gable chimneys with brick stacks. The fireplaces in the two rooms of this section are both small. The west room has a boxed corner staircase to the second floor. The second floor plan has an L-shaped hall, running along the west and north walls, with three rooms opening off of it. The partition walls are frame, with vertical board sheathing. On both floors, the major walls are plastered

The ell has a two bay, west facade and a semi-external stone chimney on the north end. It is a single room on each floor. The ground floor has a large fireplace with a wooden lintel spanning the opening; the present shelf is supported by brackets. The corner cupboard west of the fireplace and the boxed staircase on the opposite wall both have narrow vertical beaded board sheathing. In the loft, there are small windows very close to the floor on the east and west walls. Window frames on both floors are beaded boards. EEINSTRUCTI

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The frame addition on the east end is two stories with one room on each floor. It is of fairly recent construction with sawn members throughout. It does not interconnect with the stone section on either floor.

There is a porch across the south facade and one across the rear facade that also jogs around the ell. The well housing sits on the rear porch.
