Mr. Snowden was awarded the contract on the 11th day of July 1963. This contract was made in the name of the United States of America represented by the Acting Regional Director, National Capital Region, National Park Service, Department of the Interior, Washington 25, D.C., as the contracting officer and Mr. Robert L. Snowden, 246 North Washington Street, Rockville, Maryland, as the mortician. The specifications for relocation of human remains were part of the contract and the contract number is 14-10-0028-2684 on file at the Office of the National Capital Region, National Park Service, Department of the Interior, Washington 25, D. C. The contract was signed by Mr. Robert L. Snowden and Mr. Robert C. Horne, Acting Regional Director, National Capital Region, National Park Service. Mr. Snowden's signature was witnessed by Mrs. Robert L. Snowden and Mr. Joseph N. Antosca, Civil Engineer, National Capital Region, National Park Service.

5. Contract Operations:

a. General Operations: Operations were begun on Monday, July 22, 1963, at the Mount Glory Cemetery site and were completed on Tuesday, August 6, 1963, insofar as disinterment of remains from this site is concerned. The contractor worked a 5-day week (Monday through Friday inclusive) for a total of 12 working days at Mount Glory Cemetery. No time was lost due to bad weather. Remains were transferred daily to the Fisherman's Cemetery, Rockville, Maryland, a distance of approximately 12 miles. The remains of 113 graves were disinterred from Mount Glory Baptist Cemetery, of which the remains of 110 graves were reinterred at Fisherman's Cemetery, Rockville, Maryland. The remains of the additional 3 graves were privately reinterred at Lincoln Memorial Cemetery, Suitland, Prince Georges County, Maryland. This private reinterment was requested by Miss Emily E. Garner for the remains of her brother, William A. Garner; her sister, L. A. Williams; and her mother, Mary C. Garner.

Mr. Clarence Spriggs identified the remains of his father, John Spriggs, his brother, Roger Spriggs, and his cousin, Leroy Lyles.

Reverend George A. Windear identified the remains of his two children, Irma and James Windear; of his mother-in-law, Oppy Weeden; of his father-in-law, James Weeden; and of his brother-in-law, Clyde Weeden.

The number of disinterments from Mount Glory Baptist Cemetery was performed as follows:

Relocation of Mount Glory Baptist Cemetery
Completion Report

1. Purpose of Report:

The purpose of this report is to make readily available in convenient form complete data relating to the relocation of the human remains from Mount Glory Baptist Cemetery, Cabin John, Montgomery County, Maryland, to Fisherman's Cemetery, Lincoln Park, Rockville, Maryland in accordance with the relocation plan approved by the United States District Court for the District of Maryland on June 18, 1963, in Civil No. 10676, United States of America vs. Certain Parcels of Land in Montgomery County, State of Maryland and C. L. Hill, et al., except as otherwise noted herein.

2. Purpose of Project:

The purpose of this project was to reinter the remains from 113 graves located in Mount Glory Baptist Cemetery to a new location in order to make available the Mount Glory Baptist Cemetery site for the construction of the Potomac Interceptor Sewer by the District of Columbia, Department of Sanitary Engineering and the construction of the George Washington Memorial Parkway by the National Park Service.

3. Location:

Mount Glory Baptist Cemetery is located in Cabin John, Montgomery County, Maryland, approximately $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles west of the District of Columbia line and approximately $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles east of Great Falls Park, Maryland. This particular tract of land lies between the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal and McArthur Boulevard.

4. Preliminary Operations:

Mr. Henry G. Weeden, Chief, Division of Urban Project Coordination, Office of Resource Planning, National Capital Region, National Park Service, and Miss Mary McColligan, Attorney, Branch of National Parks, Solicitor's Office, Department of the Interior held preliminary discussions with several local morticians and Mr. Robert L. Snowden, Funeral Director, 246 North Washington Street, Rockville, Maryland, was determined to be the most qualified. Mr. Snowden submitted a lump sum bid of \$18,995 for the complete reinterment of all remains from Mount Glory Cemetery.

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
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b. Remains: Remains encountered consisted of skeletal parts, wooden remnants of caskets, metal casket handles, a china coffee cup and miscellaneous pieces of clothing and fragments.

c. Variation in Plans: The relocation plans indicated 18 known remains as identified by marked headstones or markers and 38 possible remains as identified by unmarked field stones (total of 56 possible remains). Because of the age of the cemetery and the pattern of the markers, it appeared that approximately 200 burials had been made. In the disinterment, all possible graves were investigated and as a result of this investigation 113 remains were disinterred from Mount Glory Cemetery. In many cases, during the investigation of assumed grave sites, remains were uncovered with metal name plates indicating names and dates of the deceased. This information was recorded by the Government inspector, Mr. Baltimore, and these name plates were placed with the remains in the new wooden boxes and reinterred at the new location. All markers at the new location bore this additional information. Annexed hereto and made a part hereof are maps identified as Plan-Disinterment Site and Plan-Reinterment Site and have been assigned the National Capital Region Map File Nos. NCR 117.2-563 and NCR 117.2-565 respectively. Setforth thereon is a Schedule of Deceased indicating names, dates of birth and death, and burial sites at Mount Glory Cemetery and relocated sites at Fisherman's Cemetery. These plans which indicate the actual disinterment and reinterment supercede the original plans.

The remains from Mount Glory Cemetery were transported to their new location at Fisherman's Cemetery by truck and hearse. An appropriate cover was used over the truck.

b. Acquisition of New Site: The purchase of cemetery lots at Fisherman's Cemetery was negotiated for by the contractor, Mr. Robert L. Snowden. Mr. Snowden purchased an additional 70 grave sites at Fisherman's Cemetery for conveyance to Mount Glory Baptist Church. His contractual obligations called for the acquisition of an additional 20 grave sites. All costs were paid by the cemetery contractor and were part of his lump sum bid. A receipt dated November 14, 1963, and signed by the Trustees of Mount Glory Baptist Church verified the acceptance of this Deed of Conveyance.

6. Contractor's Organization:

a. General: Mr. Robert L. Snowden, the cemetery contractor, was also the job superintendent and he employed 6 laborers to complete the relocation. Wooden boxes were provided by the contractor and transported to the site at his expense. Reverend Windear (former pastor of Mount Glory Baptist Church) was also employed by Mr. Snowden for the purpose of assisting on the location of unmarked grave sites.

b. Safety: There were no accidents on the job and consequently no time lost.

c. Equipment: One truck and one hearse were used for the transportation of the remains from Mount Glory Baptist Cemetery to Fisherman's Cemetery. At Mount Glory Cemetery, a digging machine was used to uncover the first two to three feet of earth cover and the remaining earth cover was excavated by hand.

7. Government Operation and Personnel:

a. General: All inspection was performed by Mr. Elton Baltimore, Engineer Technician, on a full-time basis and Mr. Joseph N. Antosca, Civil Engineer, on a part-time basis.

M. C. R. 117.2-542 attached hereto and made a part hereof, unless provision is made for private removal as specified in Article VI below. The reinterment sites for the remains shall be in accordance with the schedule on the above-mentioned map. The Contractor shall make such surveys and computations as are necessary to determine the location of the grave sites which will be utilized from the information shown on the above-mentioned drawing. The Contractor shall furnish, at his own expense, all stakes, equipment, tools, and material as may be required in laying out the reinterment sites. All work of disinterring and reinterring shall be handled in a respectful and becoming manner. The opened graves from which the bodies or remains have been removed shall be refilled by the Contractor. All labor, tools, equipment, and permits necessary for the disinterring and reinterring are to be secured by the Contractor. The Contractor shall investigate areas appearing vacant in the cemetery for unmarked graves, as directed by the Government representative. Any unmarked graves discovered as a result of such investigation shall be relocated as hereinafter provided.

B. Opening Old Graves. All excavations in old grave locations shall be to the necessary depth and dimensions and hand digging where required to properly remove any existing remains. If no remains are found, the excavation will be carried to a depth of not less than six feet from the original ground surface with bottom dimensions of not less than three feet by four feet. At this location, if no remains have been found, the Contractor will collect not less than one-half cubic foot of the material at the bottom of the excavation and will reinter such as the last remains.

C. Body and Articles to be Moved. All of the body or last remains, including jewelry, identification marks, etc., casket, coffin, or other containers, are to be removed from each grave, transferred, and suitably buried in the new grave.

D. Moving Concrete or Metal Vaults. Where such vaults are encountered, they shall remain unopened and be removed to the new location intact, without being placed in a rough box.

E. Rough Box. The Contractor will furnish a box of good quality pine lumber, sound and free from loose knots, wanes, and shakes for each body or remains removed. Each box will have affixed thereto the name of the deceased, when known, and the number of the grave from which removal was made. The box shall be of sufficient size to accommodate the physical remains in the grave. The size of the smallest rough box shall be not less than 24 x 18 x 12 inches. Immediately upon affixing the identification on the rough box, a suitable temporary marker, showing the same information shall be prepared and installed at the corresponding new grave prior to transferring the bodies to the reinterment site.

RELOCATION SPECIFICATIONS

CONTRACT NO. 14-10-0028-2684

THIS CONTRACT entered into this 11th day of July, 1963, between the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, hereinafter called the "Government," represented by the Regional Director, National Capital Region, National Park Service, Department of the Interior, Washington 25, D. C., the Contracting Office, and Robert L. Snowden, whose principal place of business is 246 North Washington Street, Rockville, Maryland, the Mortician.

WITNESSETH: That the parties hereto do mutually agree as follows:

ARTICLE I. SCOPE OF SERVICE:

The work consists of furnishing all labor, equipment, and materials and performing all operations in connection with the removal of all bodies and remains, gravestones, markers, and monuments from the existing Mount Glory Baptist Cemetery, Cabin John, Montgomery County, Maryland, and the reinterment of the bodies and remains and the resetting of the gravestones, markers, and monuments in a section of Fisherman's Cemetery, Lincoln Park, Rockville, Montgomery County, Maryland, in accordance with the order of the Court approving the Mount Glory Cemetery Relocation Plan entered June 18, 1963, in the United States District Court for the District of Maryland in Civil No. 10676, United States of America v. Certain Parcels of Land in Montgomery County, State of Maryland, and C. L. Hill, et al.

ARTICLE II. CONTRACTORS RESPONSIBILITY:

The Contractor shall be responsible for the entire work under this contract and for all tools, appliances, and property of every description used in the disinterring, transferring, and reinterment of all remains and the removal, transfer, and resetting of all monuments and markers. The Contractor shall also be responsible for compliance with the requirements of all applicable state and local laws and regulations regarding the disinterment and reinterment of bodies.

ARTICLE III. DISINTERRING AND REINTERRING:

A. General. All remains removed from the existing cemetery shall be reinterred in Fisherman's Cemetery, as shown on the map identified as

the applicant not less than five days before the removal date. The Contractor shall disinter the remains, place them in the required box, and deliver the box to a licensed mortician representing the applicant at the disinterment graveside. Should the applicant or his representative fail to appear on the day and at the time stated in the notification, the Contractor shall hold the remains not less than 24 hours before transporting and reintering the remains in a grave in the new cemetery. The Contractor will be required to enclose and properly protect the box containing the remains during the 24-hour period. Where the next-of-kin elects to provide private interment, the Contractor shall pay Eighty-Five Dollars (\$85.) to the next-of-kin when such private reinterment has been completed and satisfactory evidence thereof presented to the Contractor.

ARTICLE VII. RECORDS:

After completion of all disinterment and reinterment, the Contractor shall prepare and furnish to the Government representatives ten (10) full and complete lists containing names, when the names are available, of each body and the location by plot before disinterring, and the name and location by plot after reintering. When names are not available, numbering or other suitable identification shall be indicated on the records. The Contractor shall keep a daily record, by name and location, of all bodies disinterred, transferred, and reinterred.

ARTICLE VIII. ADDITIONAL GRAVESITES:

In addition to the acquisition of gravesites at the new cemetery sufficient in number for the reinterment of all remains, known and unknown, to be relocated from the old cemetery, the Contractor shall acquire twenty (20) full gravesites in the new cemetery, and shall provide evidence to the Government representative of such land acquisition, and shall transfer to the Mount Glory Baptist Church the deeds or other instruments acknowledging that each such gravesite has been acquired and paid for in full.

ARTICLE IX. TIME OF COMPLETION:

The Mortician shall commence the services described herein upon receipt of notice to proceed and shall complete the services within forty-five (45) calendar days of such notice.

ARTICLE X. OFFICIALS NOT TO BENEFIT:

No member or delegate to Congress, or Resident Commissioner, shall be admitted to any share or part of this contract, or to any benefit that may arise therefrom, but this provision shall not be construed to extend to this contract if made with a corporation for its general benefit.

F. Removing and Transporting Bodies. Except as otherwise specified for concrete or metal vaults, the body or last remains shall be removed from the grave, placed in the rough box, sealed with cover, and identified. The remains will then be transferred in a closed conveyance to the designated cemetery and reinterred in accordance with the regular burial practice. Concrete or metal vaults shall not be placed in a rough box.

G. Reinterring. The Contractor shall perform all excavation, of whatever material encountered, including rock, for new graves to the necessary dimensions to permit free entry of the box or vault to be placed therein. The new graves shall be dug to a depth in accordance with requirements of State, County, or municipal laws, or in the absence of such laws shall be dug to a depth that will insure a minimum of three and one-half feet of cover over the rough box or vault, said distance to be measured to the finished-graded ground surface.

H. Backfill. Materials for backfill for new graves shall consist of the excavated material or borrow of sand and shall be free of trash, lumber, large clods, or other debris. Backfill shall be placed in such a manner as to provide compaction of sufficient density to prevent settlement. The graves shall be graded, prepared, and seeded with a good quality of grass seed.

ARTICLE IV. MONUMENTS, STONES, MARKERS, AND ORNAMENTS OF VALUE:

The Contractor must remove, transfer, and re-erect all monuments, headstones, gravestones, and markers, together with all ornaments of value, from the graves located in the existing cemetery to the new cemetery. All broken monuments, headstones, gravestones, and markers shall be repaired and all monuments, headstones, gravestones, and markers shall be reset in concrete foundations at the new gravesites in the new cemetery.

ARTICLE V. MARKING GRAVES CONTAINING UNKNOWN BODIES:

When unknown bodies are reinterred in the new cemetery, the Contractor shall furnish and install at each such grave a suitable metal or other permanent marker on which shall be shown such identifying information as the Government representative shall direct. The manner in which such information is inscribed on or made a part of the marker shall provide a permanent record not subject to damage by the elements.

ARTICLE VI. PRIVATE REINTERMENT:

The nearest of kin may elect to move bodies to a location other than the designated cemetery, provided the removal is made at no additional expense to the Government. Where requests for private removal are received, the Government representative will inform the Contractor as to the name and address of the applicant making the request. The Contractor shall notify the applicant in writing of the date and approximate time of day the subject graves will be opened. Such notification shall be mailed in time to reach

ARTICLE XI. NONDISCRIMINATION IN EMPLOYMENT:

In the prosecution of this Contract, the Contractor agrees to observe the nondiscrimination provisions prescribed by Section 301 of Executive Order No. 10925, dated March 6, 1961 (26 F. R. 1977), which are incorporated herein by reference. A copy of said Executive Order is enclosed.

ARTICLE XII. DEFAULT:

The Government reserves the right to terminate this contract if the Mortician fails to prosecute the work in such manner as to insure performance of this contract in accordance with its terms, except that the contract shall not be terminated for delays beyond the control of the Mortician, providing the Government is promptly notified of such impending delays.

ARTICLE XIII. INDEMNIFICATION:

The Government shall be indemnified against any loss, damage, claim, or liability arising in connection with the work performed under this contract.

ARTICLE XIV. PAYMENT:

The Contractor shall be paid the amount of Eighteen Thousand Nine Hundred and Ninety-Five Dollars (\$18,995.) upon satisfactory completion of all of the work to be performed under this Contract, which amount shall constitute full consideration for all plant, labor, and materials necessary for disinterment and reinterment of the bodies, including excavation, backfilling, borrow, layout of grave sites in the new cemetery, temporary and permanent markers, rough boxes, transportation, seeding, removal and re-erection of all monuments, headstones, gravestones, and markers, investigation for unmarked graves, and final cleaning up and shall include payments to the next-of-kin in connection with private reinterments in accordance with Article VI above and the cost of acquisition of additional grave sites in accordance with Article VIII above. Such payments will be made to the Contractor when he furnished to the Government representative the records required under Article VII above and exhibits to the Government representative the deed or deeds or other instrument or instruments acknowledging that all gravesites in the new cemetery have been acquired and paid for in full, and transfers to the Mount Glory Baptist Church, the deeds or other instruments acknowledging that twenty (20) additional grave sites have been acquired and paid for in full.

SNOWDEN completed the disinterment of the human remains from Mount Glory Baptist Cemetery, located near Cabin John in Montgomery County, Maryland, and completed the reinterment of these same remains in Fisherman's Cemetery located near Rockville in Montgomery County, Maryland, on that same day.


Affiant further states that this work was performed in accordance with specifications in contract No. 14-10-0028-2684, dated July 11, 1963, entered into between Mr. Robert L. Snowden and the United States of America.
