Though the Glaze Family cemetery is lost, there is some information on the early settlers of the Glaze Family at the Montgomery County Historical Society. Some of the descendants may have been buried in the family cemetery.
Generation 1

The Glaze Family of Montgomery County is descended from John Glaze (abt. 1676, England – Jan 1738/9 Charles Co., MD) and his wife, Sarah. They lived in Charles County, Maryland. They had eight children: Mary, Margaret, Elizabeth, Thomas, Benjamin, **Joseph**, Samuel and John Jr.

Two of their children, **Joseph** and Samuel, settled in Frederick County. Montgomery County was formed in 1776 from the lower part of Frederick County which means that earlier records for this area “may” be found at the Frederick County Historical Society.

Generation 2

1. Samuel Glaze married Elizabeth (Crawford) about 1740 in Maryland. They were thought to have had twelve children: Jane, John, Samuel, Ezebel, Nathaniel, Nathan, James, Basil, Jonathan, Mary, Alexander and Thomas.
2. **Joseph** Glaze (Abt. 1712, Charles Co., MD – Aft. 1783, Montgomery Co., MD) married Ruth Turner (Abt. 1716 – Dec. 1801, Prince George’s Co., MD). They had two children: William and Dorcas. After Joseph died, Ruth deeded property to her son William in 1798 and moved to Prince George’s County where she later died.

Generation 3

1. **William** Glaze (Abt. 1753, Frederick Co., MD - Aft 1820, Montgomery Co., MD) married Mary Offutt Clagett (Abt. 1768 – 9 Jan 1828). They had six children: Anna, Ruth, Mary Magruder, **William Turner**, Rebecca Clagett and Ann Elizabeth.

Generation 4

1. Ruth Glaze married John Spangler around 1827 in Montgomery County. There was one daughter from this union, Ann Mary Montgomery Spangler abt. 1828.
2. **William Turner Glaze** (born: 30 May 1799, Montgomery Co., MD) married Sarah Ann McElfresh. Their children were Basil T., William M., Martha W., Hamilton, Zachariah, and Rosanna. All were thought to be born in Montgomery County, MD. Basil T. Glaze was a farmer. **William M.** and Zachariah Glaze were merchants in New Market, Maryland. Basil T., **William M.**, and Zachariah were drafted in the Civil War.

After generation 4, some Glaze family members are buried in cemeteries that are still in existence.

1. Basil T. (9 Mar 1833 – 12 Jan 1913) and Mary Elizabeth (Lewis) Glaze (28 Jul 1855 – unknown) are buried at Mountain View United Methodist Church cemetery.
2. **William M.** (Aft. 1829 – 1901) and Sarah A. (Walker) Glaze (1825 – 1887) are buried at Bethesda United Methodist Church cemetery.

The *W. T. Glaze* Log House was on Bethesda Church Road. The land where the house stood is now part of the Gladhill Farm.

John Glaze, 81, is the great-great-grandchild of John Duckett King's son Charles Miles King (1814-1886). His parents were Bertie Mae King and Basil Russel Glaze. His great-great-uncle, L.G. King, ran King's Distillery and flour mill on Kings Valley Road. The distillery, which ceased operations in 1907, was the only whiskey factory in the county, according to the Montgomery County Park and Planning Commission. Glaze lives on the 100-acre family farm near Stringtown Road and his older brother, Eral Glaze, lives in the original family home on the farm. Glaze's daughters built homes on the farm.
