### Title History

- 1. Burial Ground first mentioned in land records May 11, 1875. Deed to Frederick Poole, recorded Liber EDP #13, folio 309-311, (see Exhibit "A") and "sixty two square perches of land the said Burying ground being excepted from this conveyance". Mossburgs purchase property with Burial Ground exception.
- 2. Descendants of John and Priscilla Poole have done extensive family history and produced an updated history every 10 years or so. I have included excerpts of Fifth Edition (2001) (Exhibit "B"). See page 7, paragraph #3 for another reference to burying ground.
- 3. Elgin Family bought property in 1930 from Mossburgs, again, burial ground is exempted by reference to 1875 Deed. (Exhibit "C").
- 4. Elgins sold approximately 2 acres containing Mossburg house in 1977 (Parcel 140) and property has conveyed several times since then. (Exhibit "D")

### Burial Ground Location Research Current Status

- 5. No tomb stones are intact however Charles W. Elgin, Jr. is in possession of a tombstone for Martha Michael Born 11/1/1796, died 9/16/1859. Martha Michael may to be a cousin of the Poole family. Tombstone was found in hedgerow near a large evergreen tree which no longer exists. Area has been farmed over by tenant farmers for years and no visible signs of the cemetery remain.
- 6. Charles W. Elgin, Sr. (deceased) formally of 17909 Elgin Road orally described (around 1994) childhood memories of the cemetery with several tombstones on knoll behind Mossburg/Poole House (parcel 140). Cemetery was near a large evergreen tree.
- 7. Two civil engineers, Loiederman Soltesz Assoc. (formerly Loiederman Assoc.) and Rodgers and Assoc. have examined deed and can determine shape and size but not horizontal location due to present day lack of stones or other markers.

- 8. Bob Pierce, Wetland Training Institute, has been performed initial wetland delineation of 176 acres of Elgin Family property. He located old photo in Archives at College Park dating to February 1938 of subject area which shows Mossburg House and snow covered evergreen tree with what appears to be snow on ground to north of tree (shaded from sunlight). (Exhibit "E").
- 9. In April 2002, Kettler Forlines, Inc. hired Geomodel, Inc. to perform a Ground Penetrating Radar (GPR) survey in local suspect area near old tree location. Results were not definitive. (Exhibit "F").
- 10. In late spring, 2002, Tom Kettler, Charles W. Elgin, Jr. and Bob Pierce performed some post hole size soils samplings looking for cemetery evidence. (Notes hand written on Exhibit "F").
- 11. Rodgers and Assoc. compared photo, best guess of cemetery location from topography, ground radar and locate area of interest very close to tree location from Exhibit "E" photo. Exhibit "G" shows consolidated location sketch.
- 12. Based on Poole Family genealogy and review of Monocacy Cemetery records, one might conclude that John Poole I (died 1799) and/or his wife, Sarah Collier (date of death unknown) may be buried in the burying ground in question. They are not accounted for in Monocacy Cemetery (Beallsville, just north of Poolesville) where numerous local Poole's are buried.
- 13. Next proposed step hire archeologist consultant with cemetery location experience to evaluate existing data and perform top layer soils cross-section analysis using grade-all type excavation equipment to go just below plow-zone to help pinpoint burial locations.
- 14. Kettler Forlines, Inc. proposes to use all available locational data and fence perimeter of burial ground, and convey ownership, if any, of cemetery to Town of Poolesville as part of open space dedication when the Elgin Family Property is developed for residential housing.



#### THE FIRST GENERATIONS

As anyone who becomes interested in genealogy knows, record keeping in the early days of the colonies was less than accurate. Misspelled names and discrepancies in dates were the norm rather than the exception. We know that our first Poole ancestor to come to the New World was Richard Poole. Although his exact birth date is not known, we do know that he was a landowner in Anne Arundel County at the head of the South River in 1698. It is also known that he married Johanna Duval on August 12, 1702. Most probably at this time he was in his early twenties. Nine years later, on March 19, 1711, Johanna (Duval) Poole was buried. At this point there is confusion as to whether Richard and Johanna had two sons or three sons; who the oldest was; what their names were; and whether this same Richard remarried 19 years later, to Mary Phelps. After sifting through information available, and some new information made available by 1.3.15.1 John Courtney Poole, I have reached some conclusions that I feel are logical.

Although in many places it is said that Richard and Johanna Poole had two sons, in the All Hallows Parish Register, Anne Arundel County, it is recorded that they, in fact, had three. Benjamin was baptized in 1706, and Robert in 1708. Another Benjamin was born in 1710. Because Robert, the middle son, is often referred to as the eldest son, I think we can come to the valid conclusion that the first Benjamin had died as a baby or as a very young child. Following the child's death, when Richard and Johanna had their next son, they again used the name Benjamin. I suspect that Benjamin was not this last son's full name since in other anecdotes he is referred to as "Richard." I feel reasonably certain that Richard Benjamin or Benjamin Richard was this child's name and that he is the Richard who married Mary Phelps and had nine children with her. Benjamin Richard would have been 20 in 1730. This was a common age for marriage. Had the first Richard, Johanna's husband, married Mary Phelps as his second wife and fathered those nine children, he would have become a father for the last time at the approximate age of 73 years! While this is possible, it is not likely. Therefore, we may conclude that the Benjamin Richard who was born in 1710 was the one who married Mary Phelps in 1730.

This theory is one that is also advocated by Harry Wright Newman in the genealogical book on the Duvall family, <u>Mareen Duvall of Middle Plantation</u>. Mareen Duvall was Johanna (Duval) Poole's father.

On the following page I have compiled a simple chart to briefly explain the first four generations of Pooles not covered in our genealogy. When Miss Martha Sprigg Poole and Miss Katherine Riggs Poole organized our first genealogy, they began with the fourth generation of Pooles in the New World. Perhaps some day someone will research these first four generations so that they, too, can be included.

- 1. Richard Poole, Sr.'s exact death date is unknown. Several factors point to his being dead by 1742. Johanna (Duval) Poole's father, Mareen Duvall, left two tracts of land to Johanna and to the "heirs of her body." After Johanna's death in 1711, Richard Sr. exercised an estate by courtesy of these lands in accordance with English Common Law in use in Maryland at that time. This means that Richard continued to live on, or count these tracts as his, until his death. In 1731 and again in 1741, Richard's son, Dr. Robert Poole of Islington, Middlesex, England attempted to take possession of these lands. Neither time resulted in any recorded action, but in 1741 Robert appointed Captain William Carpenter of Annapolis as his attorney. This was witnessed in England by Thomas Gough and Daniel Dulany, two men from Maryland. Daniel Dulany was "considered the most brilliant lawyer and mind in the Colonies." Mr. Dulany lived in Annapolis a few miles from the South River. In 1742 when Mr. Dulany returned to Maryland he would no doubt have informed Dr. Poole that he had "non suit" had Richard Poole, Sr. still been alive. A more detailed explanation of the proceedings can be found in the genealogy, Mareen Duvall of Middle Plantation by Harry Wright Newman on page 460. If you continue a bit further to page 463 and read the portion on Richard Poole, Jr., you will be further convinced of his existence and that he was the Richard who married Mary Phelps in 1730.
- 2. Robert Poole is often referred to as the eldest son of Richard and Johanna (Duval) Poole. He was actually their second son and it seems logical to assume that their first son, Benjamin, died in infancy or early childhood. When Robert was old enough, he went back to England, became a doctor and married Ann Gower, daughter of Sir Samuel Gower, a knight. Robert and Ann had three children. Of the two daughters, Ann died as a young child and Sarah was still alive in 1768. When Robert died in 1752 his only son, Samuel Gower Poole, inherited most of his father's estate which included part of his grandmother's lands around the South River in Anne Arundel County. These lands were Johanna's inheritance from her father, Mareen Duvall.
- 1.3.15.1 John Courtney Poole had in his possession copies of many interesting papers pertaining to Robert Poole and these papers remain with members of his family. There is a copy of Robert's will and a copy of the papers by which Samuel Gower Poole took possession of his Duvall inheritance. There is also a copy of a paper giving a Mr. Henry Hall, Anne Arundel County, power of attorney for Samuel Gower Poole and John Gower, his guardian. Several other papers seem to be affidavits to confirm Robert's marriage, death and relationship to his son, Samuel.

### THE POOLES OF POOLESVILLE

In Northern Montgomery County, Maryland, there is a small town called Poolesville. Its founding father was one John Poole (I), who, about 1800, had a store which served as the nucleus of the town that subsequently grew up around it.

John Poole (I) was the son of Richard Poole who was living in All Hallows Parish, Anne Arundel County, Maryland, in 1730. In that year the Church records show that on February 24th, Richard Poole was married to Mary Phelps, daughter of Walter Phelps; also are recorded the births of their nine children.

Richard was living as late as 1759, for in that year the <u>Maryland Gazette</u>, an Annapolis newspaper, reported that a horse had strayed from Richard's plantation at the head of South River. No record of Richard's death nor any administration on his estate has been found.<sup>1</sup>

You will notice that this information is in conflict with the information discussed in the previous three pages entitled "The First Generations." Since Martha Sprigg Poole wrote this essay, this new information has been made available and seems to refute this line of thinking.

Richard's son, John (I), was born March 21, 1733, and baptized April 28, 1734. Twenty-seven years later he acquired by purchase from Charles Hoskinson, part of <u>Resurvey on Elizabeth's Delight</u>, 238 acres. On this tract the present town of Poolesville is located.

Apparently John stayed on at Annapolis for a while. In 1767, he leased his part of <u>Elizabeth's Delight</u> to Michael Coates, a carpenter. In recording this lease, John Poole is called a "scrivener"; according to tradition, "he wrote in the Land Office at Annapolis."

About 1770, John Poole (I) and his family moved to the new home. The Census of 1776 for Sugarland Hundred (then Frederick County, but soon to become Montgomery County) shows:

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup>All Hallows Parish Records also show the marriage on April 12, 1703, of a Richard Poole to Johanna Duvall. She was buried March 19, 1711. Their oldest son, Robert, born January 31, 1708, became a doctor of medicine in England where he married September 9, 1742, Ann, daughter of Sir Samuel Gower (Knight); and their oldest son, Samuel Gower Poole, was born July 26, 1748. The latter, as oldest son of oldest son, claimed the lands of Johanna Duval, his grandmother, and they were awarded to him by the Ann Arundel County Court, 1768.

From this, it would appear that John had married Sarah about 1768. We do not know Sarah's maiden name. From a recorded Deed it is shown that Sarah's mother was named Elizabeth and that Elizabeth in 1777 was the wife of John Owen. Family tradition, however, maintains that Elizabeth Owen had formerly been married to a man named Collier, and that Sarah Poole was a child of the former marriage and was named Sarah Collier.

In 1769, John Poole (I)'s brother, Joseph, took over some of John's land and moved to what became Poolesville. Joseph lived and raised a family on his 70 acres, and Joseph's descendants continued to reside in the area.

During the rest of his life, John (I) entered into various real estate transactions, but did not acquire a large estate. It is probable that he lived on his property (later known as the Mossburg farm), about one-half mile north of Poolesville. The house on this place has a very old kitchen which may well be part of the original house. Near the house there was formerly a family burying ground, from which the tombstones have been removed.

The Will of John Poole (I), proved January 30, 1816, shows bequests to his son, John Poole (II), and to his four daughters:

Elizabeth, wife of Hanbury Jones Ann, wife of Francis Piles Priscilla Rebecca

Some years before his death (May 11, 1799), John Poole (I) deeded to his son, John Poole (II), 15 acres, part of <u>Poole's Right</u> running along the north side of what is now the Main Street of Poolesville (then called Coxen's Road). Here John Poole (II) built the first house in what became the town of Poolesville in which it is said he lived and kept store. This house<sup>3</sup> has been sometimes referred to as the Money House, presumably after a Mrs. Money, who is shown on G. D. Hopkins' map as living there in 1878.

On December 31, 1799, John (II) obtained license to marry Mary Priscilla Woodward Sprigg, daughter of Major Frederick Sprigg, and his wife, Deborah Woodward. The Sprigg family was prominent in Maryland history, various members holding from time to time high civil and military offices.

Before this marriage took place, Major Frederick Sprigg had died and Priscilla had inherited from her father a large tract near Barnesville known as <u>Happy Choice Fortified</u>, 404-1/4 acres. John and Priscilla moved there soon after their marriage and spent the rest of their lives on that land.

John Poole (II) prospered and acquired various tracts in the Barnesville and Poolesville areas, in addition to those he inherited from his father, and the Sprigg lands of his wife. At the time of his death he owned some 600 acres appraised at \$12,218.33; also five lots in Barnesville valued at \$1,350.00.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup>Richard Poole Hankins of Richmond, Virginia, has the original deed of this property as well as a number of other old original papers pertaining to the family land holdings.

The births of the children of John (II) and Priscilla are recorded in the Records of St. Peter's Parish, of which the family were members. For some years John (II) was a Justice of the Peace. His death in March 30, 1828 is recorded thus in a newspaper of the time: "Died Sunday at his residence near Barnesville, Montgomery County, John Poole, Sr., an old and very respectable inhabitant of the County."

There was no will, so Priscilla administered the estate and was guardian of the minor children. Subsequently, a Commission divided John (II)'s lands among his ten children. These were:

- 1. John Sprigg, b. August 16, 1801
- 2. Thomas Sprigg, b. July 11, 1803
- 3. William Dennis, b. August 18, 1805
- 4. Eliza, b. June 23,1807
- 5. Frederick Sprigg, b. June 19, 1809
- 6. Sarah Elizabeth, b. March 16, 1812
- 7. Isaac Richard, b July 26, 1815
- 8. Ann Priscilla Woodward, b. July 6, 1818
- 9. Mary Tomsey, b. June 23, 1821
- 10. Martha Deborah, b. June 23, 1821

All these children spent their lives in the Poolesville area. John Sprigg lived for a time in Clarksburg. Thomas became a physician and built the handsome brick house on the main street in Poolesville. William Dennis iived in a large frame house opposite St. Peter's Church in Poolesville. Eliza married Leonard Hays and lived in Barnesville. Frederick married Mary Wilson and lived in the former Wilson home next door to his brother, Thomas. Sarah married successively two Jones brothers, the latter of whom had been the husband of her sister, Mary, who had died. Sarah lived a few miles east of Poolesville in a charming stone house. All of these houses are in use today. Isaac Richard died without issue and Martha Deborah died unmarried. Ann Priscilla married William O. Sellman and lived near Barnesville on part of the Sprigg property.

Most of the grandchildren of John (II) and Priscilla continued to live in the Poolesville area. Several of the Sellman family went to Texas. With the next generation, however, their descendants have scattered. Many do not know about their ancestors and have lost touch with their relatives.

John Poole (II) from whom members of the John Poole Association are descended, was born in 1769. That was about the time his parents, John Poole (I) and Sarah moved from Anne Arundel County to what was then Frederick County, Maryland. In 1776, Montgomery County was created from Frederick County and in that year a Census was taken, showing among the inhabitants of Sugarland Hundred, the family of the older John Poole (I) which included his son, John (II), then age seven years.

The original Poole homestead was a farm just north of the present village of Poolesville. When our John (II) was 20 years old he received from his father 15 acres along Coxen's Road which is now the main street of Poolesville. Here the younger John (II) built a house which is still standing, having been occupied continuously since its erection. When John (II) built it, he used part of it for a store. The loft above was used as a bedroom.

On January 2, 1800, John married Mary Priscilla Woodward Sprigg, daughter of Major Frederick Sprigg and his wife Deborah Woodward. "Prissa" Sprigg was born on April 21, 1780. At the time of her marriage she had become owner of a tract of some 400 acres near Barnesville, having inherited it from her deceased father. Here the young couple made their home for the rest of their married life.

John Poole (II) was not active in public affairs, but he became a prosperous farmer. He was for a number of years a Justice of the Peace and on the Vestry of St. Peter's Episcopal Church where he sometimes acted as Lay Reader.

John (II) and Priscilla had ten children, all of whom spent their lives in the Poolesville area. John died on March 30, 1828; Priscilla died May 2, 1866. They were buried in the family plot (on the Frederick Procorus Hays farm), but later their stones were removed to Monocacy Cemetery at Beallsville. All of their children and most of their grandchildren as well as many of their descendants of later generations are buried in this Cemetery.

I reviewed the file on the Title Report for the farm and have determined that the reference to the burial ground is mentioned in the Deed from Annie N. Mossburg, widow, and others to Edward W. Elgin and John T. Elgin, as tenants in common, dated November 8, 1930, recorded in Liber 514, folio 102, one of the Land Records of Montgomery County. A copy of the Deed is enclosed. The abstract is of poor quality and I have tried to reproduce it so that it is readable. The Deed reference to the burial ground can be found in a Deed to Frederick S. Poole, recorded in Liber EBP No. 13, folio 309, one of the Land Records of Montgomery County.



Our abstract work is performed by an office in Rockville and usually covers a period of only 60 years, however, this Deed goes back to 1930 for the base title. You probably are familiar with the conveyances from that date since it has been in the "Elgin" Family during the interim period. Please let me know if there is any other information I can provide you from the file.

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

#### Introduction

On April 23, 2002, GeoModel, Inc. conducted a Ground Penetrating Radar (GPR) survey for Kettler Forlines, Inc. on a hill behind 17915 Elgin Road, Poolesville, Maryland. The area surveyed included a 100-foot by 100-foot area on a hill suspected of being a former cemetery.

### **GPR** Equipment

The site was scanned with a SIR-2 digital control unit and a 400 MHz antenna. Subsurface reflections were recorded on the hard drive of the SIR-2.

### **Transect Locations**

GPR transects were generally made 2.5 feet apart across the site in both the east-west direction and in the north-south direction (where accessible).

#### Results


Continuous reflections were received from depths of up to approximately 6 feet. The sandy and clayey soils at the site allowed fair penetration of the subsurface.

Numerous GPR anomalies were delineated by GPR at the site (see site map). It is difficult to interpret the GPR anomalies as either possible gravesites or caused by other objects such as old tree roots or rocks. The GPR anomalies do not appear to be orientated in a regular pattern usually associated with cemeteries.

It is recommended that a number of these GPR anomalies be excavated to determine the cause of the anomalies.


#### Limitations


