Additional Information:

The Isaac Shoemaker family burial ground was established by 1853 (when Ann Williams Shoemaker died). The Isaac Shoemaker family farm was established in 1839 by Quaker Isaac Shoemaker. Traces of vinca remain in the burial ground. There are no visible headstones, but two stone markers about 4" wide and 25- 30" long buried vertically within the burial plot, with only a few inches of stone above ground, were found here in 1983 by Richard Erdman. As Quakers, Isaac Shoemaker and his wife may not have used headstones; their graves were once marked by rose bushes. However, family members remember seeing headstones for additional related graves many years ago (per Nancy Shoemaker Werner and Albert Shoemaker family archives at Georgetown University Library). Historical sources for the cemetery include a 1925 deed referencing the cemetery at: liber 368 folio 203.
