





### Jack C. Cohen, FAIA Senior Partner

Mr. Cohen directs the programming and administration of CHHKK. On a project basis, he contributes his knowledge of the economics of design, construction, financing and marketing.



Recognizing the responsibility of the architectural profession toward the community, Mr. Cohen has been active in public affairs. Such service has led to his being given a Public Service Award from Montgomery County, Maryland and an Outstanding Service Award from the Montgomery County Jewish Community Center. His professional achievements have been recognized by the National Association of Home Builders and by Catholic University. From the latter, Mr. Cohen received an Alumni Award in 1973.

Mr. Cohen is a registered architect in ten states including Maryland, Virginia and Washington, D.C. He is a member of the Historic Annapolis Preservation Society, Sigma Xi honorary fraternity and a Corporate Member of the Potomac Valley Chapter of the AIA. Additionally, Mr. Cohen served as chairman of the National AIA Housing Committee for two years. He holds the degree of Architectural Engineering, Magna Cum Laude, from Catholic University.

### Leonard A. Haft, AIA

Mr. Haft has headed the design section of CHHKK for twenty years. In this capacity he has led design teams on such complex undertakings as the Montgomery County Jewish Community Center and the Asbury Methodist Village in Gaithersburg, Maryland.
