9. Description: This eight bay brick house sits on a hillside facing east. The original five bay, two-and-a-half story house was enlarged in the 1960s by a north three bay, two story addition with a west ell garage. In 1977 a south swimming pool enclosure was constructed of brick. There are six-over-six double-hung windows, flanked by black wooden louvered shutters. The gable and shed roofs are covered by wooden shingles. There is a saw tooth cornice line on the east elevation of the original house.

Significance: The Darby/Offutt Farm, presently called Windridge Farm, links two "pioneer" families prominent in Montgomery County history. The farmhouse was apparently built by Zachariah Offutt, who was born around 1730, and was one of the third-generation Offutts in the county. It was sold in 1855 to Lawrence A. Darby, born in 1829 and a third-generation Darby in the county.

A third-generation Offutt in (Montgomery) County, Zachariah Offutt had been a private in the Revolutionary War. He began buying land in the county in 1777 and is said to have built three large brick houses, all still standing. This house, on the "Petersburgh" track went to his second son, Andrew in 1806 along with 371 acres. Andrew married Elizabeth Warfield in 1802. The first of their nine children was born in 1803 at "Petersburgh", indicating that the family lived there before Andrew acquired the property from his father.

After Andrew's death Lawrence A. Darby purchased 219½ acres in 1855. He had been born in 1829 at "Amsterdam", the next door farm across the creek, where his father and grandfather had lived before him. Lawrence later became judge of the Montgomery County Orphan's Court, and raised grain and livestock on 600 acres of farmland. In 1856 he married Sallie A. Chiswell; they lived for a awhile at "Petersburg", then returned to the family home "Amsterdam" until it burned down in 1891. He returned to "Petersburgh" while a new home was being built at "Armsterdam".

Lawrence and Sallie Darby sold Petersburgh to their son Thomas C. in 1904, but Thomas and his wife may have already been living there after their marriage in 1895. Thomas sold the house in 1945 to Allan L. and Marian B. Hulsizer. They sold the Darby/Offutt Farm to Thompson H. Butz in 1960. He has enlarged the house twice.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This eight bay, brick house sits on a hillside facing east.

Built on fieldstone foundations the original five bay, two and a half story house had a Flemish-bonded east elevation and common bonded brick walls on the other elevations. In the 1960s a three bay two story brick addition with a west ell for garage space was attached to the north elevation of the original house. In 1977 a modern shed roofed brick addition was built on the south elevation to enclose the swimming pool. The entire house is painted grey.

The east (front) porch has a flat roof supported by paired columns. Brick steps mount from the north and south to a central stoop which bows out to the east. The steps and stoop are enclosed at the outer edge by a wrought iron metal railing. The north wing has an east porch with a shed roof supported by four wooden posts. There is a terrace along the south elevation. The entire south wall of the 1977 addition is glass and sliding glass doors.

There are six over six double hung windows, set in flat arches in the center section, and flanked by black wooden louvered shutters. There is a six light casement window in the south gable end of the original house.

The gable and shed roofs of this house have wooden shingle covering. There is a sawtooth cornice line on the east elevation of the original house. There are north and south interior end chimneys in the original house and one exterior stove pipe on the west elevation.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Darby-Offutt Farm, presently called Windridge Farm, links two "pioneer" families prominent in Montgomery County history. The farmhouse was apparently built by Zachariah Offutt, who was born around 1730, 1 and was one of the third-generation Offutts in the county. It was sold in 1855 to Lawrence A. Darby, born in 1829 and a third-generation Darby in the county.

The house is located on a tract named "Petersburgh", so named and patented by Zachariah Offutt.² Since "Petersburgh" first appears as a property of Z. Offutt's in the 1795 County Tax List and does not appear in the List of 1793, it may have been acquired and patented between those dates.³ Zachariah bought land in the County on 11 occasions, the earliest in 1777.⁴ The son of John Offutt, Zachariah had been a private in the Revolutionary War. He married Elinor Beall, had eight children and died before July 4, 1807. He is said to have built three large brick houses, all still standing, which he gave to three of his sons, the one on the "Petersburgh" tract going to his second son, Andrew.⁵

Zachariah conveyed 371 acres of the "Petersburgh" tract to Andrew for \$5 in 1806. The property included "all buildings, improvements, woods, ways, waters, appurtenances, etc. Three years later, Andrew bought an additional 42 acres of the tract for \$420 from Alexander Offutt. 7

Andrew was born in 1775 and married Elizabeth (or Eliza) Warfield in 1802. They had nine children. The first, Evelina, was born in 1803 at "Petersburgh", indicating the family lived there before Andrew acquired the property from his father. A seventh child, Juliet, was also born at "Petersburgh" in 1815.

There are four gravestones in the Offutt family cemetery east of the house: Andrew Offutt (the date of death is obliterated, but was probably 1837 or 1838); Eliza Offutt, widow of Andrew Offutt, died July 12, 1863, age 81 years, 28 days; Evalina Beall, wife of Horatio Beall (daughter of Eliza and Andrew Offutt), died August 18, 1875, age 72 years; and Juliet W. Offutt, daughter of Andrew and Eliza Offutt, born Nov. 20, 1815, died July 3, 1866.9 Since the farm was not in the Offutt family's possession after 1855, they must have been given the right to continue to use the cemetery by the new owners.

On a petition for division of Andrew Offutt's property after his death, Lot No. 1, consisting of $219\frac{1}{2}$ acres, was sold to Joshua W. Offutt, one of his sons, on June 22, 1855, for \$18.50 per acre, or a total of \$4,060.75. Five months later, on November 14, 1855, an order passed by the Circuit Court substituted Lawrence A. Darby as purchaser in place of Joshua. 10

Lawrence A. Darby, who later became judge of the Montgomery County Orphan's Court, had been born January 1, 1829, at "Amsterdam", the next door farm across the creek. His father and grandfather had lived on that farm before him, and his father, George Darby, cultivated 309 acres. In later life, Judge Darby was to own a total of 600 acres of of farmland, including both farms, where he raised grain and livestock.

In 1856, Lawrence married Sallie A. Chiswell; they had nine children. He was elected judge of the Orphan's Court in 1891 and was three times elected to the Board of County Commissioners. 11 He lived at "Petersburgh" for a while after his marriage, but then returned to the family home, "Amsterdam". His daughter, Grace Newton, was born at "Petersburgh" in 1863. He lived at "Petersburgh" for a time after "Amsterdam" burned down in 1891 and before he built a new home on that

In 1904, Lawrence and Sallie Darby sold the "Petersburgh" property to their son, Thomas C. Darby for \$5,487.50, reserving the "right of usage over the road leading from their farm at the foot of the hill to the southeast of their residence to the mouth of the Monocacy and Georgetown Road". 13 However, one of Thomas Darby's daughters believes her father moved into "Petersburgh" in spring, 1896, a few months after his marriage on December 5, 1895, to Estelle Allnutt. The couple's five daughters were born in this house between 1900 and 1910. In 1914, Thomas Darby bought the Dawson farm across the road and built a new home there, but continued to farm "Petersburgh". By that time the

house, which had only three bedrooms, "had gone down some". It was occupied by Martin Poole, who farmed the property for Thomas Darby, and his family. 14

In 1945, Thomas Darby, then a widower, sold part of "Petersburgh", plus land acquired from the Allnutts, to Allan L. and Marian B. Hulsizer and to Lorenz A. and Virginia K. Meyer. 15

The Hulsizers acquired the portion with the house and lived there and farmed the property until 1960. They also bought the portion deeded to the Meyers in 1949. 16

Thompson H. Butz, who owned hundreds of acres of property in the area, bought the Darby-Offutt farm from the Hulsizers in 1960, 16 and enlarged the house twice. The property is still a working farm, and is called Windridge Farm.







Northwest Facade 5/8/74 Barn Butz Farm

The house is a two story, brick structure with flush gable end chimneys. The doorway is the center bay of the five-bay main (north) facade. The windows have jack arches and brick sills. The sash are 6/6 double hung. There is a cornice consisting of three courses of projecting bricks, the center one set saw-toothlike. The house is laid up in Flemish bond on the main facade and common bond on the ends and rear facades. At the west end a two story, three-bay addition has been added and at the west end a shed-roofed, frame swimming pool enclosure placed at right angles to the house.

South of the house is a frame bankbarn sitting on a stone foundation.

East of the house is an Offutt graveyard. The stones are mid-nineteenth century.
