The Beall Cemetery is significant because of its historical association with the Bealls, a prominent Montgomery County family who were the first family to settle in the Georgia Avenue/Bel Pre Road section of the county.. In the eighteenth century, the Bealls obtained patents on hundreds of acres in this area, including tracts known as "Lay Hill" and "Bel Pre"; the former was surveyed for James Beall in 1716. Eighteenth century Beall tract names have been retained in the twentieth century streets and subdivisions in the area.¹

The occupants of the Beall Cemetery are descended from Robert Beall (1670-1755), one of three Beall brothers who emigrated to America in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries from Scotland. Known as "Robert the Scotsman", he settled in Maryland before 1690, acquiring a 460 acre tract in Montgomery County called "Resurvey on Exeter".²

Daniel Beall (1748-1835) who, (with his wife Nancy and other family members) is buried in the cemetery, was Robert's grandson. Daniel Beall owned approximately 500 acres in the area at the time of his death, including 316 acres of "Bel Pre". He was probably born on the farm "in Wheaton district, Montgomery County" where he spent his

entire life; a prosperous farmer, Daniel Beall owned "large tracts of land and many slaves".^{3,4}

In his will, dated April 7, 1830, Daniel Beall leaves the tract "Bealls Folly" to his son Thomas; instructs Thomas to pay another son, John Lackland Beall, \$40.00 and leaves John part of the tract "Bel Pre", 91¹/₄ acres; leaves James A. Beall and Cephas Lazenby part of "Exeter", 270¹/₂ acres; and to Thomas Beall, "Daniel Beall being indebted to Thomas for work, labor, and diligence in and about the Plantation", he bequeaths 224 acres of "Bel Pre".⁵

Daniel's son, Thomas (1803-1865), who may have been the Thomas Beall (d.1865, 62 yrs.) whose tombstone was in the cemetery in 1976, left six children, of which several are buried in the family cemetery: Mary Jane Beall (wife of Charles Bready), Ell Maria Beall, and Isaiah F. Beall.⁶

According to neighbors of the cemetery, there were a number of other stones in the cemetery which were damaged during a weed-clearing operation several years ago.

An earlier description of the Beall Cemetery describes it as follows:

"Cemetery on old Beall estate (c. 1750), on Bel Pre Road, near Layhill, Montgomery County, Maryland. Overgrown with weeds. A private unimproved road ran south from Bel Pre Road for approximately 300 feet to an old residence. The cemetery was approximately 200 feet south of Bel Pre Road, and 100 feet west of the private road mentioned. (At right angle to Bel Pre Road, private road ran straight tangent to the frame residence.)"⁷

The largest standing stone in the cemetery is inscribed with the names of Daniel Beall, his wife Nancy, and his daughter Eliza.

In 1865, Isaiah Beall, Daniel Beall's grandson, owned the property on which the cemetery is located. Thomas Beall owned the adjacent property nearer to Layhill Road. James Rannie owned land in the Aspen Hill area.

The Bealls were related to Colonel Ninian Beall, who was the founder of the Presbyterian Church in Maryland.

BOOK REVIEWS

Trimble Families. A Partial Listing of the Descendants of Some Colonial
 Families. Compiled by Eugene E. Trimble, 5203 Flanders Avenue,
 Kensington, Md., 1958. 257 p. \$7.50

The compiler of this genealogy has attempted to gather information
 on many of the families named Trimble in Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia,
 South Carolina, Georgia, and Kentucky. He examined all secondary litera-
 ture, secured the assistance of several persons whose help he acknowledges
 and has made a search himself for much of the data which he presents.


He has divided the book into nine parts. He does not try to relate
 families of the same name for which he does not have conclusive proof.
 Readers of this magazine will be most interested in Part VII which dis-
 cusses Joseph Trimble (died 1784) of Cecil County, Maryland, and his
 descendants. The ninth part is on a Clemens family of Kentucky.

The numbering system is easy to use. The book contains extracts of
 wills, church records, and biographical sketches, and is well footnoted.
 This work, which is mimeographed, is a pioneer study on this family and
 deserves much praise.
