Public Access

In 1823 the Deacons of the Bethel Baptist Church constructed a Church with adjoining burying grounds at the western limits of the Town. This cemetery was used until the late 19th century when development of this West End necessitated widening of streets and the removal of some of the bodies. Twenty-eight marble and sandstone grave markers remain under the towering trees, but many are cracked and in poor condition. In 1973 the Montgomery County Historical Society deeded the land to Peerless Rockville Historic Preservation, Ltd., for preservation and maintenance of this site.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The old Baptist Cemetery provides a quiet reminder of an earlier, slower era in Rockville, a contrast to the adjacent busy intersection. There are approximately 28 stones, many cracked and in poor repair, oriented to the east. Most are carved from marble or sandstone, and appear in a variety of sizes. Most are simple and round-headed in shape, but a few are more decorative.

The earliest remaining stone in the cemetery is dated 1839 (date of death). There is a wrought iron fence around the four graves in the Bouic plot. There are three large white oaks (150-175 years old) and black locusts of varying sizes on the property. Scrub hedgerows and concrete sidewalks delineate the cemetery's modern boundaries.

Attached is a catalog of stones which were visible when Peerless Rockville took title to the cemetery, compared with earlier listings. There are fewer stones now as a result of vandalism and of relocation of graves when Van Buren Street was constructed and Jefferson Street was widened and relocated. Old-timers recall brick sidewalks along Jefferson Street, and both iron and wood board fences around the cemetery.

The Old Baptist Cemetery is important as a reminder of the early Baptist Church in Rockville, and as the final resting place of several persons notable in Rockville's history. The Cemetery adjoins the lot where the original church stood, at the intersection of Jefferson and South Van Buren Streets.

On August 19, 1821, eight men and women declared themselves to be independent of the Old Seneca Baptist Church and began to form a new church in Rockville. On October 20 of that year, the Bethel Baptist Church was established, with Joseph H. Jones as its first pastor. Solomon Holland deeded land to Jesse Leach and William Chisewll, deacons of the Bethel Baptist Church, "forever in trust for said Church and to and for no other e, intent or purpose whatsoever". The 67½ square perches of land cost \$17.20. Note was taken of this land being at the western limits of the small town, "(except that if Jefferson Street in the Town of Rockville should ever hereafter be extended so much of said lot as will be taken off by the street shall be gratuitously (sic) given up for the use of said street)".¹ A church building was erected in 1823 to face Jefferson Street; the land adjacent to the church was to be utilized as the burying ground.

In 1863, "five sober and discreet persons, male members above 21 years of age" incorporated "The Baptist Church at Rockville, Maryland". The following year, the church building was rebuilt on the same site.

Several persons notable in Rockville's history were members of the Baptist Church, and are buried in the cemetery. Samuel Clark Veirs (1798-1872) operated Veirs Mill on Rock Creek; his wife Julianna (1797-1878) is also buried there; Samuel C. Veirs was postmaster of Rockville (1837-41) and later Chief Judge of the Orphans' Court. William Veirs Bouic, Jr. (1816-1896) Veirs' son-in-law, was an Attorney, judge, farmer, State's Sttorney, President of Rockville's Board of Commissioners (Mayor of Rockville), organizer of the Montgomery County Agricultural Society, trustee of the Rockville Academy, and a director in the C & O Canal Company;² he and his family are buried here.

The congregants maintained the Church to accommodate its growing population.³ Location of the Church and cemetery at the west end of town placed it in the midst of the town's expansion during the post-Metropolitan Branch "boom years" at the end of the 19th century. Henry Copp's 1890 real estate promotional brochure, "Peerless Rockville", showed a photograph of the Church and cemetery (attached) as one of the local places of worship. The itinel reported in 1897 that 16 bodies had been removed from the Baptist to the Rockville cemetery due to street improvements. (continued)




STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE - Old Baptist Cemetery, Rockville, MD (continued)

In 1908, the Baptists erected a new building at the corner of Jefferson and Washington Streets. It cost \$14,671 and was built largely through the contributions of Spencer C. Jones, son of the first pastor Joseph Jones. A parsonage was constructed next door in 1914. In 1913, the Sentinel reported that the "Old Baptist Church building in use for 90 years and abandoned six years ago to be razed. Material to be sold and proceeds used to beautify lot and cemetery. The old bell, cornerstone to be retained. Material will be used by Mr. Hewitt to build house on his lot on Bridge Street." In 1958, an educational building was added to the church; this section faced Jefferson Street.

The Baptist Church sold its property at Washington and Jefferson Streets in 1971, moving to a modern structure on Adclare Road. In 1973, the cemetery was deeded to the Montgomery County Historical Society for the purpose of its preservation and maintenance.⁴ In November, 1983, Peerless Rockville took title to the cemetery, and is now responsible for its maintenance.
