DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This attractive one and a half story frame church stands at the heart of the Sugarland community, at the junction of the Sugarland Lane and Sugarland Road (at the southeast corner). Behind it (west) is the community center and a smaller building now used as a meeting hall for the church and community.

The church faces east, and its gable roof line runs east-west. The facade is three bays in width, and the building is four bays in depth. The front door is flanked by large windows with double hung sashes having two over two panes. The tops of all windows are rounded. Today the facade has a projecting vestibule, but it is an added feature. Above the front door is a small circular window, a decorative feature. A short bell tower with a pyrimidal roof was built on the peak of the roof and still has its old bell. The eaves are boxed and carry short returns. The entire structure rests on cut sandstone mined from the Seneca quarry.

Behind the church is the community center, which stands on the site of the first church, according to Tilghman Lee. It faces east, and its facade contains a door centrally located flanked by two windows. The building is two bays in depth. The frame is covered with weatherboards and the roof with tin.

Lee remembers that the first church was about the same size as this community hall, except that it was not quite as wide. Its principal framing members were hewn logs, which rested on stone piers. The frame was covered with board and batten outside and with tongue and groove siding inside (known as "wainscotting" by Tilghman Lee). There was no bell tower. The result was a modest, simple country church, similar to many others in rural Maryland.

After the new church was built in 1893, the older one was used as a hall until the late 1930's when it was torn down, constructing of a larger hall began. Lee recalls that its frame was too top-heavy and part of the building was blown down in a severe storm before it was completed. Eventually lumber for that hall was used to construct this one. It stands on the same foundation as the first hall, but since it is smaller, the foundation extends out beyond the back of the building.

The cemetery contains a number of graves. Many are marked with gravestones, but many more are unmarked. This cemetery has been in use since the last quarter of the 19th century.

SPECIFIC DATES1893BUILDER/ARCHITECTScott BellSTATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This church stands on property purchased in 1871 and is one of the first tracts purchased by the Black families who founded the Sugarland community. This illustrates the high value that they placed upon church. This deed (EBP 9/74) also declares that a school could be built on this site, either in the church building itself or separately. Thus the church and the school were the two principal institutions of the early community.

This deed of 1871 lists William Taylor, Patrick Hebron, and John H. Diggs as Trustees for this Methodist Episcopal Church. They were therefore the patriarchs of the community and their houses, which have been described by Tilghman Lee, have been recorded in this survey. A picture of Patrick Hebron has been copied. Interestingly, this tract was sold again in 1891 back to an enlarged set of Trustees for the church : William Taylor, Washington Kerrey (sic), Patrick Hebron, Fenton Taylor, Samuel Lee, John Adams, Lewis M. Garnett (Deed JA 19/25). This deed says that the church was called "Taylor's Chapel", probably after William Taylor, just as Warren M.E. Church was named after one of its Trustees, Isaac Warren.

According to Tilghman Lee, the carpenter Scott Bell from Poolesville constructed the present church. His grandson Raymond Bell still lives in Poolesville and could be a valuable informant for future oral interviews. Lee also says that none of the old church records have survived and does not know of any photographs of the church or its congregation. Further interviews beyond the limited scope of this preliminary survey should be conducted to identify and record more materials related to the history of this old church, begun in 1871, before those materials are lost.

PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The church is a frame structure with a gabled gable. Flanking the entrance porch are round headed windows; there is a circular window in the gable. The doorway is double, with heavy applied mouldings and a fanlight. Along either flank are four round-headed windows. A small, rectangular apse, lit by side windows, projects at the west end. The church sits on a foundation of cut sandstone.

Behind the house is a one story, frame structure with a three bay gable-end facade.
