The History of St.Rose

Beginnings - 1812

The beginning of St. Rose of Lima Parish goes back (years, when a Protestant named Francis Cassatt Clo his Catholic wife, Ann Jane Byrne of Philadelphia, bo plantation overlooking the Seneca River in what is no Seneca Creek State Park. There, in 1812, they built Woodlands, a 24-room mansion which soon became center of Catholic life for the families in the area. Many were often celebrated in the large ballroom. The Arc of Baltimore and visiting priests made it their headquest while in the area.

First Building - 1836

In order to please his wife and her sister, Mrs. Ellen Francis Clopper donated a portion of the far corner c Woodlands estate for the building of a church in 1834 Maher became the major benefactor for the construction the church, but others also contributed to the project

Planned to be the most beautiful church in Western Maryland, it was built of brick manufactured on the cestate. A brick porch led into a foyer which opened comain body of the church. A balcony in the rear overl 13 rows of pews on each side. (The first two rows or right side were reserved for the Clopper family.) The five windows on each side and two windows in front the porch. Mr. Clopper was given the honor of choos name for the new church. He chose St. Rose in honor Rose Landry White, who was then Mother Rose. As a of the Sisters of Charity of Emmitsburg, Maryland, M Rose had succeeded Mother Saint Elizabeth Seton af having served as her assistant.

Sunday Mass, which was followed by Benediction in afternoon. The priest stayed the night and celebrate again the next day, after which he would visit the fa the area. In summer, the priests moved to The Woo and made their rounds from there. An important sur event was St. Rose's feast day. Not only the residen faithful, but also former pastors and parishioners wh moved away, would return to celebrate. Destroyed by Fire - 1883

The original church building, made of brick, stood fo years until destroyed by fire on April 2, 1883. Since t was no water to quell the flames, the building was siruins; only the vestments and the communion vesse saved. Some of the bricks from this original building preserved in the cross in the brick walk leading to the church entrance.

The exact cause of the fire will never be known. Amostories told is one suggesting that a mouse upset a limatches, igniting a quantity of linseed oil. Another sithat an altar boy did not totally extinguish the incentional putting away the censer.

Present Church Building - 1883

The white wooden church which now stands on the s the brick church contains the original cornerstone in northern foundation wall. While the cornerstone give as the date of the original church, it is believed that stone mason misread 1836 on a piece of paper and the wrong date. In 1987-88 a major renovation of the church was undertaken. Structural damage required complete replacement of the roof as well as straight the walls. The building was completely gutted to inst electrical, heating and cooling systems. Nearly all of furnishings were also replaced at the same time. A r detailed record of the project is contained in the Mer Book placed in the church. The pride we feel in the t the renovated church is an expression of reverence t predecessors in the faith whose efforts made St. Ros possible. In addition, it is an expression of hope in the future generations to follow us, who will continue to
