

Directions to Howard Family Cemetery - Georgia Avenue (97) to left on Damascus Road (650) to right on Howard Chapel Road and left on Elton Farm Road.

Elton Farm Road ends at a walking/horse back riding trail into the woods of Patuxent River State Park (GPS N39*14.924' / W077*04.872'). Follow the trial (north) into the woods for about 100 yards to a split and take the left fork (northwest). Trail continues down hill for about 1 mile and takes a slight turn left and then back to the right and crosses a small stream. The trail then goes uphill and near the top of the hill goes to the right of a large old house (Gaither/Howard House) (GPS N39*15.096' / W 077.05.080'). Beyond the house the trail enters a farm field. At this point the cemetery is about 300 yards straight ahead by a large tree in the farm field. Follow the trail along the right perimeter of the farm field to a metal fence surrounding the cemetery (GPS N39*15.310' / W 077*05.030').





Howard House Cemetery Elton Farm Road, West Side #23/8


The Howard cemetery is significant as a representation of the prosperity of a former slave in Montgomery County. Enoch George Howard was a prominent man in his lifetime, and few resources exist to indicate his contribution to the historic African American community in this area. In 1857, Howard, a slave and field foreman of the Gaither Family, bought freedom for himself and his wife Harriet with savings obtained from selling produce. Howard had cultivated a small plot of land given to him by Beale Gaither, his former master. In March of 1860, Harriet, Howard's wife, bought their five children from Samuel R. Gaither.

Two years later, Howard purchased the Gaither house and 289.5 acres from Frederick Gaither's grandchildren. Enoch George Howard prospered as a farmer and landowner, acquiring a total of 600 acres of land during his lifetime. On this land a number of sites and structures have existed over the years, including a burial plot for the Howard family.

The buildings have deteriorated since the days of the Howard family, but the cemetery is in good condition. It has been maintained over the years. The tombstones are in good condition and a contemporary wood and wire fence has been placed to protect it from the cultivated fields that surround the site.
