

Dear Mr. Larson:

It has recently come to my attention, through conversation and correspondence from Mr. C. Frank Bready of Woodbine, MD, that the Bready Family Cemetery, c. 1869, may be threatened by impending development. According to Mr. Bready, some damage to the cemetery has already occurred.

Human burial grounds, marked or unmarked, are sacred places deserving of respect and protection. They are also protected by a number of State laws. I respectfully urge that discussions between all parties concerned with the Bready Family Cemetery be initiated at once to prevent disturbance or further desecration of the cemetery. I also urge the enforcement of all applicable State laws governing burial sites, as well as all local laws, ordinances, or regulations which apply to burial site protection in Montgomery County. The principal State laws governing burial sites in Maryland are attached.

I trust that the desecration or destruction of burial sites, and particularly of the Bready Family Cemetery is not your intention, and that, in fact, this cemetery will be preserved as l) sacred ground, 2) the rightful property of the living heirs (often duly recorded by covenants in the land records of the county in which it is located), and 3) as a priceless cultural and historical site protected under the laws of this State.

As you proceed to discuss with Mr. Bready the feasibility and desirability of relocating the Bready Cemetery to prevent future desecration, and whether State or local aid can be made available to help fund that move, you may want to look at Section 14-122 of the Real Property Article of the Annotated Code which states, in part, "Any county or municipal corporation that has within its jurisdiction a burial site in need of repair or maintenance may, upon the request of the owner or with permission of the owner of the burial site in need of repair or maintenance, maintain and preserve the burial site for the owner." (Italics added.) While this section of State law does not specifically address the question of financial assistance for moving a threatened historic cemetery to a more protected site, it does suggest that some public responsibility for the preservation of these historic sites does exist.

Thank you so much for your kind attention to this matter. I am willing to be of assistance in any way I can to help bring about a satisfactory resolution of the situation.

Dear Mr. Larson:

This is to request your assistance in attaining state funding to disinter four ancestors currently buried in a family cemetery located on state property formally owned by the Llewellyn Fields Subdivision.

Before being more specific about this request from the Bready family, let me give you some brief details surrounding the history of our family cemetery. In 1849, at age 53, David Bready moved to Montgomery County from Frederick County, where he had been farming on rented land at Carrollton Manor near Adamstown. He purchased 540 acres along what is now Layhill and Norwood Roads and proceeded to set up a productive farm.

Upon his death in 1869, he was buried in a family cemetery established on the farm. Also buried in the same cemetery is his wife, sister and one of his sons. Three hundred of the original acreage remained in the Bready family until it was "purchased" under public domain by Montgomery County for a park The Bready Cemetery has been maintained continually by family members since its establishment, even though the land around it has been owned by others for many years.

With the start of the Llewellyn Fields Subdivision in 1990, we have experienced vandalism to the cemetery. The greatest damage was when our wrought iron gate and five feet of the foot-wide concrete wall were removed by what must have been a front end loader. With the extension of Norbeck Road through the subdivision close to the cemetery, we expect even greater vandalism problems.

As you can see, the enclosed subdivision and road plan shows an access road to the cemetery. This access road will involve a considerable expense which is pertinent to the family request. Our proposal is to disinter the four ancestors and bury them in one grave in the Norbeck Memorial Gardens Cemetery (also a former family farm site). We are asking the state to financially support the disinterment process with funds that would be used to develop an access road.

I have researched the expenses involved in disinterment with local funeral homes and have summarized them as follows:

On behalf of the Bready family, I humbly suggest that you give serious consideration to this request. I feel that it will be a win-win situation for all concerned.
