Item I give and bequeath to my daughter Elvira M. Miles fifty dollars.

Item I give and bequeath unto my five grand children of every 16 weeks five dollars each

Item I give and bequeath unto my grand daughter Sarah Elizabeth Stone one negro boy William
to her and her heirs forever, for the use of my daughter Margaret Anne Stone, until Sarah Elizabeth
Stone comes to the age of twenty one.

Item I will and bequeath all the rest of my estate both personal & real to be sold and
divided equally between my children that is to my H. Scott Elvira M. Miles Seancy M. Scott

Emeline B. Scott Leonard L. Beale, Catherine A. Beale, Lucinda Gifford Grafton Beale, Mary A.
Stone Ruth E. Viles. If either of my children should die before this should come in force, I will that
my trustees shall become guardian for their representatives to as not to stop the date of my property
until there can be other guardians appointed for them.

Item It is my will and desire that Leonard L. Beale Richard M. Jones and Grafton
Beale shall be my trustees in full power and authority to collect and receive all debts due or
owing unto me and to pay all my just debts and to do all things as fully and fairly as I
could do as if I was present and in proper person without taking out any letters of administration
on this my last will and testament in which for compensation I allow to my trustees
five per cent in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this seventeenth day of

In the Name of God Amen I Martha Shultz of Montgomery County and State of
Maryland, being of a sound mind, memory and understanding, and knowing the certainty of life
and the certainty of death, do make, publish and declare this to be my last will and testament.

First. I commit my soul to God, who gave it and my body to the dust from whence it was taken, requesting my executors, herein after to be named, to have my earthly remains decently interred, the necessary expenses of which to be paid (including tomb stones not to cost more than twenty dollars) out of the proceeds of my estate.

2^o The debt that I may owe at my death, I direct and instruct my executors to pay also from the proceeds of my estate.

3^o To my sister Elizabeth Davis, I give and bequeath all that part of my real estate, lying and being in the town of Peabody, in the county of Middlesex and State of Massachusetts, being a part of a tract of land called Peabody, West of my house or garden lot, adjoining the lands of William Poole, including my late residence to have and to hold during her natural life. — And after the death of the said Elizabeth Davis, the said real estate, I give and bequeath to my niece Rose Money, in fee simple.

4^o In addition, I further give to my niece Rose Money, the first choice of my best feather beds and bedding my best Bureau — large looking glass, Sophia's Workbox, like my fine tea set, silver plate spoons and two old set silver bar spoons — cook stove — wear robe and first choice of two large chuds and cloths, in fee simple.

5^o To my niece Maria Anne Wilson my second best bed and bedding my second choice bureau, toilet stairs and toilet bottling glass — seven best parlor chairs and best large Walnut dining table, also my center table — my full fine set of dinner ware and one set of white stone China soup plates — one set new silver tongs and one set alabaster table spoons.

6^o To my sister Margaret Vicence, I give one hundred and fifty dollars current money — my white cradle and black velvet bonnet.

7^o — to my sister Elizabeth Davis, I give and bequeath one hundred and fifty dollars current money to and the receipt of my household furniture and kitchen utensils.

8^o The remainder of my effects apparel, I give and bequeath to my heirs above named, to be equally divided between them, each to share alike.

9^o For the execution of this my last will, I name and appoint my sister Elizabeth Davis and Margaret Vicence, executors and witnesses in other wills, that I have heretofore made. I declare and publish this to be my last will and testament. The witness of which, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this twenty fifth of October 1851
