Description

The brick miller's cottage, known now as Valley Mill House, was built by Peter Kemp, a German, a short while after purchasing the land in 1794. Kemp built the central bay of the existing three bay house first, then added a smaller bay on the east side in the early 1800's. These two bays are of brick construction, face south, and constituted the entire house until a second addition was built on the west side in 1948. This third bay has wood siding on the exterior, and is painted white as is the trim for the entire house. Each of the three bays has a steeply-pitched gable roof of varying heights, with the central bay being the highest. The entire roof is covered with wood shingles.

The central bay has three floors and rests on a high brick basement. The three floors include a basement level and an attic. The main entrance to the house is on the left side of the central bay's south facade. It is framed by a recent pedimented portico with stairway. There are also three windows on this facade: two at the entrance level, and one at the basement level. The two at entrance level are six over six double hung sash windows, with wide wooden frames. This bay has a fireplace in the center of the east wall; the chimney projects through the apex of the gable roof.

The first addition is two stories high, and is offset from the central bay by one-half of a story. The south facade of this bay sits flush with that of the central bay. This bay is easily distinguishable because of the lower cornice and roof lines than those of the central bay. This bay also has an entrance door on it's south facade, only this one is at ground level. The second floor of this bay is also an attic level. This addition also has a fireplace on the center of it's east wall. The chimney is flush with the exterior wall, and passes through the apex of this bays roof.

The second addition is the only major alteration to the original house. This third bay is adjacent to the west wall of the central bay, however it does not sit flush with the south facade of the original house. This setback, along with the different materials, allows the original house, I feel, to maintain it's integrity.

Description (continued)

The brick work on the south facade is Flemish bond, while the sides and the rear are done in common bond. Some decorative features in the brick work include a water table, and random glazed bricks.

The house is basically a split-level house with a total of five floors (including the basement); three in the central bay, and two in the first addition. There is a conservative molded cornice that runs along the eaves of the entire house. The house remains in good condition, and has outlived all but the stone foundation wall of the original and two subsequent mills.

The mill ruins are located in a slight ravine about 120 feet from Valley Mill House, at about twenty degrees west of south. There is a swale in the ground running north to south, along the side of the house down to the site of the mill. This is all of what remains of the head race, by which the water was diverted from Paint Branch stream to turn the paddle wheel and operate the mill. The tail race is also still clearly visible. The mill was modernized in 1874 when a new turbine was installed and the traditional use of the paddle wheel was abandoned. Part of this turbine remains.

The mill's foundation is of random laid stone construction. The mill measured approximately 30 feet by 30 feet, with a ground floor from three to four feet below ground level. An inner wall or separation is apparent; it is about eight inches wide and divides the ground floor into a one-fourth and three-fourths arrangement. From floor level to top the walls measure eight feet at the highest point. The last mill to operate this site was constructed in 1879 and was a two and a half story frame building covered in horizontal siding with a gable roof covered in wooden shingle. A brick chimney rose from the southwest corner of the mill building.

The only other structure within the boundaries of the nomination, is a covered wooden pedestrian bridge. This bridge is a non-contributing structure, and crosses the swale of the head race at the southwest corner of the house.

Statement of Significance

Valley Mill House and Valley Mill are historically significant for their long association with the milling industry in Montgomery County. The milling industry is very important to the county's history, and it played a large role in the development of the county. Valley Mill House is an excellent example of 18th century architecture and construction and is one of the few early small houses remaining in Montgomery County. The house is in good condition and maintains its integrity in that it still serves as a residence.

Historical background and significance

The history of the milling industry in this area begins in the 1720's when land was first patented to Richard Snowden. There are references to a "Snowden's Mill" along Paint Branch, but the exact location is unknown. Another tract was patented to Ninian Edmonston in 1763, who sold it to Walter Beall in 1771. The first evidence of a mill on this site was from the public sale of this land in 1774, noting that Beall didn't last long in the milling industry. The land passed hands several times before being bought by Peter Kemp in 1794.

Peter Kemp expanded the tract from 3.75 acres to more than 114 acres. He then built the miller's house where it stands today. Kemp put an addition on the house in the early 1800's, and lived there and operated the grist and sawmill until he sold it in 1835 to Dr. Washington Duvall. Dr. Duvall built a new mill at the site of Kemp's original mill. Duvall's mill became Montgomery County's leading producer by the mid-nineteenth century. Dr. Duvall was a state senator from 1860 to 1865. He continued the milling operation throughout the Civil War, and until the mill's sale in 1879.

The mill and house were purchased at this time by Franklin Pilling, who built another mill, replacing the old paddle wheel with a more efficient Foole and Hunt turbine. This is the mill that became known as Valley Mill, and thus Valley Mill House. Several years later, however, Pilling went bankrupt and the mill was sold at public auction.

Statement of Significance (continued)

Valley Mill changed hands several more times as the milling industry grew less and less profitable in Montgomery County. Most of the mill industry had moved to the Midwest where land and labor was cheaper. By 1930, Valley Mill had ceased to operate, and the building was abandoned. Several years later the building was dismantled, with some of the materials being taken offsite to construct other buildings.

Verbal boundary description

Boundaries are indicated on the accompanying base map. The parcel is a four-sided polygon. Beginning at the intersection of East Randolph Road, and the driveway for Valley Mill Park, proceed north 320 feet along the edge of the driveway and parking lot. Then proceed east 200 feet along the edge of the concrete patio of an adjacent swimming pool. Then turning south, proceed 250 feet back to East Randolph Road. Then proceed southwest along East Randolph Road back to the point of origin.

Verbal boundary justification

The boundaries encompass all sites and buildings which are directly connected to the historical significance of the nomination. These boundaries also exclude the recent parking area and swimming pool with bath house.







9. Description: This five bay by one bay house sits on a hill facing south. Built in three sections, the two east sections are brick and the west section is frame. The east brick section is common-bonded, two bay, one story, and the west brick section is flemish-bonded, three bay, one-and-a-half story. There is a gabled south porch on the west brick section. It is supported by four narrow wooden posts. There are six-over-six double hung windows set into segmental arches on west brick section and diamond paned windows set into flat arches on the east brick section. The house has gable roofs with wooden shingles. The numerous outbuildings include a barn, bath house, swimming pool, 5 "open-air" shelters, tool shed and foot bridge.

The mill, of which only the foundation remains, is located in a ravine. It indicates the outline of a structure, approximately 30 feet by 30 feet.

10. Significance: The Valley Mill House is an early, substantial miller's house. It is connected with the Snowden family, influential Montgomery County settlers. In the late 18th century, Peter Kemp of Frederick County purchased land in the area, including the mill. He sold it in 1835 to Dr. Washington Duvall, successful doctor, state senator, and large landowner. Duvall constructed the last mill on the site in 1879, a saw and grist mill.

As milling became less rewarding as a business venture, due to technological advances which made the water-operated mills obsolete, the property was sold by Duvall's heirs and the mill and Valley Mill house sat abandoned. The mill was dismantled in the 1940s.

After receiving 48½ acres in 1948, Mabel and Robert McEwan restored the old brick house, added recreational facilities, and opened a summer day camp. The M-NCPPC has purchased the property for park land, over a period of 10 years.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This five bay by one bay house sits on a hill facing south. It was built in three sections. The two east sections are constructed of brick and the west section is frame. The east common-bonded brick section is two bays and one story; the west flemish-bonded section is three bays and one and a half story. On the south elevation, west brick section, there is a porch with a gable roof supported by four narrow wooden posts. The south (west) door is wooden paneled. The south (east) door is glass and wooden paneled. There is a brick patio on the north elevation. The north doors are glass and wooden paneled. The decorative brickwork includes a watertable and random glazed bricks.

The six-over-six double-hung windows in the west brick section are set into segmental arches while the diamond paned windows in the east brick section are set into flat arches. There are two four-light casement windows in the east gable of the west brick section and one four-light casement window in the east gable of the east brick section.

The house has gable roofs with wooden shingle covering. There is a massive chimney at the east gable-end of the west brick section and an end chimney at the east gable end of the brick section.

The south door (west section) opens into a center hall. An open string, single run, very steep stairway ascends north to south along the west wall. West of the hall is the frame addition. There are two bedrooms north and south, and a small bathroom in the frame section. East of the hall is a large living room and east of the living room and down several steps is the kitchen.

The kitchen has a flagstone floor. Four flagstone steps and two wooden steps lead to the west brick section where the floor has very wide random-width boards. The walls and ceilings are plaster over lath. The kitchen has wooden paneled walls. There is a double fireplace on the east wall of the west brick section. The windows are deeply recessed.

The numerous outbuildings include a barn, bath house, swimming pool, 5 "open-air" shelters, tool shed and foot bridge.

The mill is located in a ravine, possibly at one time a stream bed. Of the mill only the foundation remains. It indicates the outline of a structure, approx. 30 feet by 30 feet. It has a ground floor that is 3 to 4 feet below ground level. An inner wall or separation is apparent; it is about 8 inches wide, splitting the room into a 1/4 and 3/4 combination. In the smaller section, water seeps from the remnants of a well. In one wall there is a hole with is a round concrete disk.

When standing inside the structure, the walls measure highest at 8 ft. They are constructed of large rocks set on top of each other to form a wall measuring anywhere from 1-1 1/2 feet in width. In places a mortar was used to help hold them together but for the most part they are tightly packed with smaller rocks.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Valley Mill House is an early, substantial miller's house. It is connected with the Snowden family, influential Montgomery County settlers.

In the early 18th century Richard Snowden received several land grants in the southeast section of the County. One of these tracts, granted to him in 1723, was called "Snowden's Mill Land" or "Snowden's Mill". This land encompassed much of the Paint Branch stream valley, and it is believed that the first mill on the site existed at that time. A dam was built to create a mill pond (a landmark still present today) and according to tradition the little brick miller's house was constructed in the mid-18th century.

In the late 18th century, Peter Kemp of Frederick County purchased land in the area, including the mill on Northwest Branch.¹ He operated the mill for many years before selling it, the miller's house, and the surrounding lands to Dr. Washington Duvall in 1835.² Duvall was a successful doctor, active in the Democratic party, a state senator from Montgomery County, and large land owner. He made his home in the Fairview estate across the road, and probably had an overseer operate the mill business and live in the brick house.

The last mill on the site was constructed in 1879 and the G.M. Hopkins Atlas of that year indicated that it was a saw and grist mill.

Upon his death a few years later, Washington Duvall's heirs divided up his immense estate and gave to Benjamin Duvall several tracts of land which included the mill.³

Milling became less rewarding as a business venture as technological advancements made the water-operated structures obsolete. In the late 19th and early 20th centuries Benjamin Duvall sold the land. After passing through several hands, the mill lands and the Fairview estate were purchased by Winifield Overton. The mill and miller's house sat abandoned. Sometime in the 1940s the mill was dismantled.

Overton's granddaughter, Mabel McEwan, was given 48½ acres of land surrounding the mill house in 1948.⁴ She and her husband Robert restored the old brick house, built a swimming pool and a bath house behind the building, and opened a summer day camp, called the Valley Mill Camp. In 1967 the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission made an agreement to purchase (over a period of ten years) the McEwan's property for park land.

<p>This small, 18th Century brick house is unique to the area. The only other structure that bears a resemblance to it is the much larger "Cherry Grove" in Ashton. The style of architecture is Georgian (although the house is only one-story-with-loft.) The main part is a three-bay section that sits on a high brick basement. There are basement windows just above ground level. Brick work on the main (south) facade is Flemish bond, while the rear and sides are done in common bond. The entrance is in the west-end bay here, and the doorway is framed by a recent pedimented-portico-with-stairway. The decorative brickwork includes a watertable and random glazed bricks. The steeply-pitched "A" roof is covered with wooden shingles, and a large chimney stack sits flush with the east-end wall. Woodwork includes wide old window frames, 6/6 sash, and a conservative, molded cornice that runs along the eaves around the entire house. Attached on the east end is a smaller, two-bay, brick wing with a central door and a tall narrow chimney, flush with east-end wall. A now-dry mill race is spanned by a small covered bridge, just west of the house.</p>

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Architecturally, this structure is absolutely in a class by itself. Its historical background is also unique. It is located on a tract of land called "Snowden's Mill Land" granted to Richard Snowden (of the "Montpelier" family) in 1723. At that time there was a small mill located here-perhaps the first one in Mont. Co. There were several successive milling operations here in later years, including Dr. DuVall's Mill in the Civil War period. The last mill (shown in the 1936 HABS photos) was built in 1879. It was dismantled around the 1940's, and some materials went into the Weathered Oak Herb Farm in Bethesda.






