The John R. Champayne Farmhouse, constructed circa 1860, was previously surveyed by Lois Snyderman and Susan Escherich in 1991. The property is unaltered since the time of the previous survey.

National Register Evaluation:

The John R. Champayne Farmhouse, constructed circa 1860, was previously surveyed by Lois Snyderman and Susan Escherich in 1991. The property is not eligible for the National Register of Historic Places due to a lack of architectural distinction and material integrity, and loss of setting. The property is not eligible under Criterion A. The condition of the house, outbuildings and setting no longer have sufficient integrity to represent a continuum of agricultural use. Historic research indicates that the property has no association with persons who have made specific contributions to history, and therefore, it does not meet Criterion B. 

Description: Large lilac bushes and trees flank the driveway to this two-and-a-half-story, three-bay farmhouse. The facade of the ell-shaped structure faces north. It has a full three-bay front porch with a hipped roof supported by turned posts. The house has a box cornice and returns under the gables. It has been aluminum sided. The front door has a three-light transom and 2/2 side lights. These are echoed by the central window in the second story which also has side lights. Remaining facade windows are 2/2. Two 6/6 windows, one over the other, are at the rear of the north end of the house. Windows have louvered blinds. There are two chimneys at either end of the standing seam metal roof. They are flanked by small windows in the gable ends. A two-story addition has been made in the angle of the ell.

The setting of the house has been adversely impacted by an adjacent highway and shopping center. In addition, the surrounding property is being developed for a subdivision.

<u>Outbuildings</u>: At the rear of the house is a corn crib, three small sheds in a state of collapse, and a small barn.

The John R. Champayne farmhouse is significant as an example of vernacular architecture typical of that constructed in Montgomery County from the mid-nineteenth through the early twentieth centuries. Together with its outbuildings, it is representative of the farm complexes that existed in Montgomery County in the period when it was predominantly agricultural and which are rapidly disappearing from the Layhill Road area.

was one of the roughest places in our district, there was no improvements on it, it was mostly covered with pine.' Champayne cleared the land and, with his hired hands, built a dwelling house, blacksmith shop, stable, corn house and other necessary outbuildings. Thus, 'the land generally and everything else about it has been improved as much as anyplace in the neighborhood comparatively, during the time Champayne lived on it.' In the final decree, it was decided that the land and premises not be sold until after the death of John Champayne.

"In 1880, the Champayne farm was sold by trustee to Sarah R. Nicholson for \$1827.20. The farm at this time was improved by a two-story frame dwelling house of eight rooms with an attic and a back building. Also on the property was a meat house, corn house, stable, dairy and other necessary outbuildings along with a blacksmith shop, wheelwright shop and a paint shop. The farm also had apple and peach orchards. The farm has remained in the Nicholson family ever since. Richard P. Nicholson, a farmer, was born and raised on the farm and lived there with his wife, Catherine, until his death in 1969. Catherine and her aunt, Maude Leizear, resided in the family farmhouse until Catherine's death in 1973. The farmhouse is now the property of Richard and Catherine's three daughters, Catherine McKimmie, Myrtle Royall and Richie Pontious, who rent the house out."

The farmhouse is now part of the proposed subdivision of "Legend Knolls".
