Thomas D. Riggs House 20501 Georgia Avenue #23/068

The Thomas Riggs House, located on the east side of Route 97, near Sunshine, is now part of Camp Bennett of the Central Union Mission. The property includes the mid-19th-century Thomas Riggs House, a 19th century crib barn, a chicken house, and several non-contributing buildings and structures associated with the camp, including sleeping cabins, crafts cabins, a chapel, and a swimming pool. The Riggs family cemetery, which is located within the boundaries of the adjacent property, is located east of the dwelling, in a wooded area. The Thomas Riggs House currently serves as the residence/office for the director of the camp. This structure is the surviving, much altered, remnant of a productive 19th-century farming operation in this part of Montgomery County. The farm was begun and run for much of its history by Thomas Riggs, great-grandson of the founding member of the Maryland line of the prominent Riggs family, and nephew of George W. Riggs of Washington, D.C., founder of the Corcoran, Riggs and Company, predecessor of the Riggs National Bank of Washington. However, the property lacks the integrity necessary to meet the requirements for historic designation based on the criteria stated in Section 24A-3 of the *Historic Preservation Ordinance*.

The Thomas Riggs House, located on the east side of Route 97, near Sunshine, is now part of Camp Bennett of the Central Union Mission. The property includes the mid-19th-century Thomas Riggs House, a 19th century crib barn, a chicken house, and several noncontributing buildings and structures associated with the camp, including sleeping cabins, crafts cabins, a chapel, and a swimming pool. The Riggs family cemetery, which is located within the boundaries of the adjacent property, is located east of the dwelling, in a wooded area. The Thomas Riggs House currently serves as the residence/office for the director of the camp.

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

The Thomas Riggs House was built in two distinct phases in the mid-19th century and has been significantly altered during the second half of the 20th century. The dwelling consists of a small, oneroom, gable-roofed stone structure with a massive stone and brick end chimney, built circa 1865, and now serving as a kitchen/dining wing; and a two-story, two-bay, gable-roofed frame structure abutting the original stone structure and built circa 1879. These two sections of the house are enveloped by a one-story, wraparound, shed-roofed addition built in the mid-20th century.

Exterior Description:

The stone wing:

The stone wing is the oldest part of the house. Probably originally built as a dwelling when constructed circa 1865¹, this stone structure became the kitchen, when the frame house now adjoining it was built in 1879.² The original house has been significantly altered on the exterior and interior by modern additions, leaving only the roofline and end chimney wall intact and visible.

The south elevation is the only exposed exterior wall of the house. It consists of the gable end wall with the chimney. The stone wall is parged with concrete or stucco and its attic level windows to either side of the end chimney have been blocked up. The chimney has a large stone and brick shaft. It has been heavily parged and the brickwork reworked.

The east and west elevations of the stone wing are behind the onestory, wrap-around addition, while the north elevation abuts the

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larger frame structure. The steeply pitched gable roof, however, is visible above the wrap-around addition, providing a view of the building's original massing.

The interior of the building reveals partially exposed hewn rafters and a large stone fireplace surround.

The main block:

The main block of the house--the two-story frame structure--was built by 1879, as described in an 1879 deed. This deed describes the frame house as having five rooms and a kitchen (the stone wing). It is today encased on the first story by a contemporary wrap-around addition, and features all new doors and windows, vinyl siding and a standing seam metal roof. The interior retains no historic fabric.

The west (front) elevation of the house is two bays wide with two single, 1/1 windows in the second story and the wrap-around shed-roofed porch on the first story. The shed-roof extension has banks of vinyl windows and a single entry door.

The north elevation is three bays deep with a tri-partite replacement window towards the rear bay on the first story and three, single 1/1 replacement windows on the second story. The attic level has a single 1/1 replacement window on center.

The east elevation has a one-story, shed-roof addition against the first story and wood deck above, corresponding with the second story. The shed-roofed addition is, here, set upon a stone foundation, and though clad with vinyl siding and featuring new windows, was an original shed wing to the house.

Outbuildings and Cemetery:

Crib Barn: The crib barn and attached chicken house is located to the north of the house and is in deteriorating condition. The crib barn is a timber frame, mortise-and-tenon structure with a sidedrive crib, covered with a gable roof. The walls are clad with the vertical wood boards, and the roof with standing seam metal. The attached chicken house abuts the west end of the crib barn, making the drive-through crib unusable for vehicles. It is a frame, makeshift type addition with vertical board siding and a standing seam metal roof.

Riggs Family Cemetery: The Riggs family cemetery is located several hundred yards east of the dwelling in a patch of woods located on adjacent property. The cemetery is overgrown with vegetation, and

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includes several inscribed tombstones, both upright and fallen. The most notable tombstone is that of Remus Riggs (1790-1867) and his wife Catherine (1811-1893). It is a stone obelisk set upon a stone base with the name RIGGS embossed on it. One face of the obelisk includes the name, birth and death dates of the couple, an epigraph, and at the top and bottom of the obelisk, decorative stonework. Thomas Riggs (died 1889) is not buried in the cemetery, but was apparently laid to rest in a cemetery on adjacent property.

Non-Contributing Buildings:

There are several non-contributing buildings which are part of the camp facility. One of these structures is a low-lying concrete block living facility northwest of the house and barn. The other buildings are clustered at the end of the long drive that leads from Georgia Avenue to the house and beyond to the camp. These buildings include log sleeping cabins, mess cabin, swimming pool and other facilities.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Thomas Riggs House, located at 20501 Georgia Avenue is presently a part of Camp Bennett and standing in a much altered state. This structure is the surviving remnant of a productive 19th-century farming operation in this part of Montgomery County. The farm was begun and run for much of its history by Thomas Riggs, great-grandson of the founding member of the Maryland line of the prominent Riggs family, and nephew of George Riggs of Washington, D.C., founder of the Corcoran, Riggs and Company, predecessor of the Riggs National Bank of Washington. However, the property lacks the integrity necessary to meet the Criteria of the Maryland Inventory of Historic Properties and the National Register of Historic Places.

Historic Context:

The Thomas Riggs House appears on the 1865 Martenet and Bond Map of Montgomery County as the home of Thomas Riggs. Thomas Riggs was the son of Remus Riggs (1790-1867) and Catharine Riggs (1811-1893), both of whom are buried in the family cemetery located on adjoining property to the Thomas Riggs House.

The house was built by 1865 by either Thomas Riggs, or his father, Remus Riggs. Remus Riggs was the grandson of John Riggs (1687-1762), who established the Maryland line of the Riggs family in the 18th century. Remus Riggs was also the brother of George Riggs of Washington, partner of the Washington banking firm of Corcoran, Riggs and Company, predecessor of the Riggs National Bank of Washington.

Remus Riggs owned the property on which he and his son, Thomas, both had houses until his death in December 1867. As stated in his will, "to my son, Thomas D. Riggs, I bequeath the farm on which he now resides."³ Although it is not certain when Remus Riggs came to Montgomery County, the 1879 G.M. Hopkins Map indicates that Thomas Riggs, listed as a farmer in the directory, had settled there in 1833.⁴

In 1876 Thomas Riggs conveyed a mortgage on his farm to Robert H.

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MacGill, his brother-in-law. The following year, MacGill died leaving his wife and Thomas' sister, Amelia Riggs MacGill, as the recipient of this mortgage. In 1879, Amelia MacGill foreclosed on the mortgage and offered the farm for sale. The notice of the sale described the farm as being 275-1/4 acres and improved by a "frame dwelling of five rooms and a kitchen (probably the stone section), a stable accommodatig eleven horses with 70 feet of shed attached, a corn house, wagon sheds, blacksmith shop, dairy, two tenant houses and all the other necessary outbuildings." Orchards of apples, pears and peaches were also found on the farm, which was reported to be one of the most productive farms in the area. Receiving no acceptable bids on the farm, Amelia MacGill purchased it herself for \$6,055.50 in October of 1879.⁵ That same year, Thomas Riggs was listed as the owner of 275-3/4 acres of land in Thomas Riggs died in 1889; his obituary in the the area.° Sentinel, identifies him as a "young farmer" and son of Remus D. Riggs.⁷

In 1902, Amelia MacGill died. In her will, she stated that the farm was to be held in trust for the use of Thomas D. Riggs, during his lifetime⁸, and then sold and the proceeds to be divided between the children of John A. Riggs. In August of 1920, the executor of Amelia's will conveyed the "Thomas Riggs Farm" to Susan, Robert, Anna, Lawrason and John Riggs and Elizabeth Howard. Five months later, the heirs sold the 276 acre farm to Charles Thomas Nicholson.

Charles and his wife, Mamie, defaulted on their mortgage, and in 1932, the property was put up for sale at public auction. It was purchased by a Ober W. and Mary C. Daily, who the following year, sold 234 acres to the Central Union Mission for the establishment of Camp Bennett. Dedicated in July 1934, camp Bennett provided work for unemployed men, and provided garden produce for the Emergency Children's Home and Homeless. Over the years, thousands of children from inner-city neighborhoods in Washington, D.C. have

The Thomas D. Riggs farmhouse is significant as an example of vernacular architecture typical of that constructed in Montgomery County from the midnineteenth through the early twentieth centuries. The single story stone wing (with a large stone chimney) at the south elevation of the later frame structure is very old. It appears on the 1865 map of the county, as the home of Thomas D. Riggs, but may be older then 1865. It was probably built by either Thomas of his father, Remus Riggs, who owned the property until his death in 1867 when the farm became the legal property of his son. As stated in his will, "to my son, Thomas D. Riggs, I Bequeath the farm on which he now resides."¹ Thomas, who first settled in the area in 1833, was a Brookeville farmer.²

In Februry of 1876, Thomas conveyed a mortgage on his farm to Robert H. MacGill.³ In 1879, Amelia Riggs MacGill, wife of the late Robert MacGill, foreclosed on the mortgage and offered the farm for sale. The notice of the sale described the farm as being 275 1/4 acres located on the road from Brookeville to Westminister (1 1/2 miles from Brookeville) near the intersection with the Union turnpike. The property adjoined the lands of A.B. Davis, Rev. Hutton and B.W. Howard. It was reported to be one of the most productive farms in the area. At this time, it was improved by a frame dwelling of five rooms and a kitchen (probably the stone section), a stable accomodating eleven horses with 70 feet of shed attached, a corn house, wagon sheds, blacksmith shop, dairy, two tenant houses and all the other necessary outbuildings. Orchards of apples, pears and peaches were also found on the farm. Amelia MacGill, receiving no acceptable bids on the farm, purchased it herself for \$6055.50 in October of 1879.4

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In March of 1902, Amelia died. In her will she stated that the farm was to be held in trust for the use of Thomas D. Riggs, during his lifetime, and then to be sold and the proceeds to be divided between the children of John A. Riggs.⁵ In August of 1920, the executor of Amelia's will conveyed the "Thomas D. Riggs Farm" to Susan, Robert, Anna, Lawrason and John Riggs and Elizabeth Howard.⁶ Five months later, the heirs sold the 276 acre farm to Charles Thomas Nicholson.⁷

In 1932, Charles and his wife, Mamie, defaulted on their mortgage and the farm was offered at a public sale. The property was described as a farm of 240 acres adjoining the lands of Harry Musgrove, Austin Powell and others, including 160 to 170 acres of cleared, farmable land. The improvements to the farm consisted of a seven room stone and frame house with a pantry, three porches and a cellar. Also on the farm were a corn house with a wagon shed attached, a large hog house, machine shed, meat house, two tenant houses and other necessary outbuildings. The farm was sold to Ober W. Daily for \$8000.⁸ A year later, Daily sold the farm (then consisting of 233.4 acres) to the presentowner, Central Union Mission.⁹ The house serves as the private residence of the director of this still operating farm.

"Train up a child in the way he should go" has long been on the Camp Bennett sign in Brookeville. For many years, the camp has tried to fulfill this goal.

Thank you for contacting us with questions on 20501 Georgia Avenue. Please note that this is Locational Atlas site #23/68 (The Thomas D. Riggs House)? As a Locational Atlas site, DPS must make the first determination as to whether or not the proposed work constitutes Substantial Alteration at this site.

Our office has some information about the site in our files. The historic house is located at a great distance from the proposed new house site. In addition, the historic house is sited at a great distance from Georgia Avenue, sitting deep within its environmental setting. It appears that the proposal will have no effect on the historic house, either directly or in terms of even being within its view. As such, it should have no effect on subsequent deliberations by the Historic Preservation Commission as to its potential for historic designation.

I hope this is helpful in terms of providing some additional information to assist you with your determination. I know the applicants are eager to proceed with their construction project.

At your request, we have reviewed the MHT Inventory Forms for resource #23/68, the Thomas P. Riggs House, and #23/124, the Thomas Benson House. We have also made site visits to each of these properties.

The Thomas P. Riggs House, (#23/68, is an interesting site - portions of it appear tobe early 19th century and it is associated with the prominent Riggs family. However, therehave been numerous alterations to the structure including a relatively recent one-storyaddition that wraps the house. These alterations and additions have seriously impaired thearchitectural integrity of the resource. For this reason, it is our staff's judgement that theThomas P. Riggs House would**not**be eligible for the National Register.

The Thomas Benson House, #23/124, is relatively intact except for the asbestos shingle siding and the some of the rear additions. The house form is somewhat unusual for the Brookeville area and jerkin head gable ends are not extremely common in this part of the County. Based on the available information, it is difficult to determine if the resource has important historical associations - little information on Thomas Benson is included on the MHT Inventory Form. We can concur that the property is not eligible for the National Register, but may want to consider the resource for designation on the County's <u>Master Plan</u> for Historic Preservation.

I also understand that your office has noted resources #23/62, Belmont, and #23/67, Pleasant Hill, as being demolished. In both cases, the primary structures on these two sites were demolished many years ago - long before the resources were included in the Locational <u>Atlas and Index of Historic Sites</u>. Belmont was included in the County inventory because of the existence of a two-story structure that may have been a slave quarters and a family cemetery. Pleasant Hill was included because of the existence of building ruins and a family cemetery. As part of a recent approved subdivision, these ruins and cemetery on the Pleasant Hill site have specifically been protected and will have interpretive markers. In all likelihood, neither resource is eligible for the National Register.
