



The house is a two-story, frame structure, built in several sections. The south end is a three-bay unit with the doorway in the north bay and two windows in the center and south bays. A stair hall runs through the house with a room to the south.

The north end is a three-bay unit with central door and flanking windows.

Chimneys are positioned at either end, as well as one at the center. The north end chimney is external; the central chimney was probably an end chimney for the north end before the south end was built. The south end chimney is internal.

On the east facade, a porch has been enclosed and other alterations have been made, obscuring much of the facade.

Along the slope of the gable ends are bargeboards.

North of the house is a frame bankbarn. West of the house is a shed-roofed outbuilding.

The Lorenzo Watkins house is a large rural vernacular dwelling constructed in parts. The main block of the house was built in two section and has a porch enclosure and other alterations along the facade which greatly alter the original appearence of the house. The house exhibits the influence of gothic revival architecture seen in the barge boards located in the gable ends.

The Watkins family was evidently among the earlier settlers to this area. They own(ed) a number of farms in Cedar Grove and surrounding areas during the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

The house was built by Lorenzo Watkins sometime between 1860 and 1876. It was constructed on approximately 95 acres of "Cow Pasture" which Lorenzo purchased from Vincent and Catherine Brewer for \$1,500 in March of 1859. Lorenzo ran a farm here. Then in August of 1919 he passed the farm on to his son, Joseph Dallas Watkins and his wife, Ida V. Watkins. Joseph lived here until his death in June of 1936 at which time the farm, then consisting of 162 acres, was conveyed to his three children. It was then conveyed to a single heir, Guy Watkins and his wife, Fannie Elizabeth Watkins, the present owners. thus, the farm remains in the Watkins family to this day. In 1975, most of the surrounding acreage was sols off so that now the house, frame bank barn and other outbuilding now rest on a one acre lot.

### 14-20 Lorenzo Watkins Farm

House faces east toward a tributary of Wildcat Branch, later a man-made farm pond.

The original front of the house may have been on the east, facing the tributary of the Wildcat Branch, or west, toward Watkins Road. The driveway once extended in a loop around the east side of the house, the remains of which are still evident.

The two story side-gable house is six bays wide. The north three bays are log construction, partially exposed at the July 2002 site visit. This section appears to have been the original house. The three bay south section has a central stair hall.

The original house was built between 1859, when Lorenzo Watkins acquired the property, and 1865, when it appears on the Martenet and Bond map. Lorenzo paid \$1,500 to Vincent and Catherine Brewer for 95 acres, in 1859. (Deed JGH 7:301; Catherine Crawford, 1984 MHT form. Vincent Brewer was an uncle of Oliver Watkins (13/3). Check Wm Hurley book for details of Brewer-Watkins relationship. In 1851, Oliver Watkins had purchased 200 acres in what became Cedar Grove from Vincent Brewer, File 14/27)

Lorenzo (1835-1920) married Jane Dorsey Purdum (1840-1916) in 1859. The couple had eight children. After his wife's death, Lorenzo, in 1919 conveyed the farm to his son, Joseph Dallas Watkins and his wife Ida V. Watkins. (Deed 284:9, as recorded by Catherine Crawford, 1984 MHT form) Lorenzo and Jane Watkins are buried at Upper Seneca Baptist Church in Cedar Grove. (William Neal Hurley, Jr. **The Watkins Families**, 1997, 112)


Joseph Dallas Watkins (1870-1935) married Ida V. Day (1872-1934) in 1906, at Upper Seneca Baptist Church. Their son, Guy Watkins (c1908-1988), one of three children who lived to adulthood, inherited the farm in 1936, after Joseph's death. Guy and his wife, Fannie Elizabeth (b.1913), subdivided the farm in 1975, with the house and outbuildings remaining on a one-acre lot. Guy died in 1988, and his widow Fannie Elizabeth, sold the property in 1999.


Lorenzo was the son of Alpha and Harriet Watkins. Alpha Watkins's farm was due south of Lorenzo's farm, as shown on the Martenet & Bond map of 1865. By 1865, Oliver Watkins had his farm further west, and Alpha Watkins to the south. (Martenet and Bond map)

The 1879 Hopkins Atlas shows Lorenzo Watkins at this location.

A 1985 article on Upper Seneca Baptist Church says the Watkins family first was associated with the church in the 1840s. (14/27) Probably earlier than that. White Oak Chapel was built sometime after church organized in 1805. It was a log structure near Watkins and Log House Road. It was near Lorenzo Watkins Farm. (14/27 MHT form, 1879 Hopkins Atlas)

### Lorenzo Dallas Watkins 1835-1920

Dallas Watkins was dated August 22, 1819 and filed for probate of Montgomery County, Maryland. He makes a specific bequest of his watch and chain to his son, Joseph Dallas Watkins. He then provides that seven eighths of his estate is to be divided between his seven children, all named. The other one eighth is divided into two parts: one part goes to his grandson, Russell V. Lewis, and the other half in trust to his great granddaughter Elva Lewis, daughter of his late grandson, Grover Lewis. Joseph Dallas Watkins is in the wills office of Montgomery County. Her husband receives one third of the estate, and the remainder is divided between the bequest to Russell B. Lewis and Elva Lewis. The will of Lorenzo December 21, 1920 in liber HCA 22 at folio 442 of the will records Grove. They appear alone in the 1860 census for Damascus District of Montgomery County. In the 1880 census for Clarksburg sus for Damascus, the couple are living alone. Accounting of the eight children then living, all listed by name. In the 1900 census for Damascus, she is listed as Minnie A.; he is Charley L.; and they have eight children in the household. Her will, dated April 10, 1942, was probated December 18, 1946 and filed in Liber OWR 21 at folio 135 in Montgomery County. She there lists eleven children, and three of her grandchildren, all following. Charles Lee is also buried at Upper Seneca Baptist, bom 1864 and died 1937. They had at least these children.

- Clayton K. Watkins, born September 1, 1890. He was, for many years, Clerk of the Circuit Court for Montgomery County. As such, there are hundreds of land record books bearing the initials, CKW, with a following numeral. That is the system of book numbering used by the courty, rather than starting from book one and running into the thousands. Each clerk of the court during his tenure begins the next set of books with his initials, and continues that series during his term of office. Clayton was born August 30, 1890, and married January 31, 1917 at Upper Seneca Baptist Church at Cedar Grove, to Addie Belle Hawkins, daughter of James B. Hawkins of Woodfield. She was born October 25, 1898 and died October 12, 1961. Buried in Forest Oak Cemetery, Gaithersburg.
  - Talmadge Lodge Watkins, born 1891, died 1975, married Myrtle Bryan Burns, born June 25, 1896, and died 1979, daughter of Nicholas Edward Burns (1865) and Laura Gertrude King (1873). Dear Property Owner,

Historic preservation planning staff is beginning the evaluation of historic resources in the Goshen-Damascus area. The historic evaluation of these properties is taking place at this time because of the upcoming update of the Damascus Area Master Plan that is scheduled to begin in the next year.

Records indicate that you are the owner of the Lorenzo Watkins Farm (Resource #14/20). Your property was identified on the 1976 Locational Atlas and Index of Historic Sites as being of potential historic significance, or was noted by planning staff as being of potential historic merit. Staff will be visiting each of the 60 sites under consideration, to document the property with photographs. If you would like us to make an appointment with you for this site visit, please call our office at 301-563-3400.

Evaluation of historic resources is a careful process, as the enclosed chart reveals. The Historic Preservation Commission, Planning Board, and County Council review each property, evaluating every proposed designation to see whether it meets Historic Preservation Ordinance criteria for historic or architectural significance that would warrant its protection. Each reviewing body holds public hearings, with the County Council having the final say on all designations. Not all nominated properties are designated. Over 425 resources have been found to be ineligible for designation are have been removed from the *Locational Atlas*. The entire evaluation process typically takes about one year.

Historic designation helps to manage change, so that new construction or landscaping is accomplished in sympathy to the historic character of a property. The enclosed brochure explains in more detail the effects of designation, including tax credits that are available for restoration work.

Site visits and photographic documentation are the first step in researching historic properties. Staff will also be consulting land records, tax assessments, family histories, and other documents. Staff will summarize findings in a Maryland Historical Trust inventory form for each property. If you know of resources that would be useful in conducting this research, please contact me at 301-563-3400.
