This is a two story frame, four bay by one bay early twentieth century house with a gable roof. The facade has two entrances, one at each end, each with a transom over it. The windows are one over one light. To the rear is a four bay by one bay, two story wing. To the southeast elevation of this wing is a two story, shed roof addition. There is a small, single story gable roofed addition to the rear of the back wing and the shed roof addition.

A porch, supported by slightly tapered columns runs the length of the facade and the northwest side of the house. There is a brick chimney to the center rear of the main block and an interior brick chimney at each gable end of the rear wing. The entire house is now covered with aliminum siding.

Also on the property is a small, story and a half, two bay by one bay log house. The house can be entered from the facade which faces south and from the east elevation. The windows are six over six lights. It has an exterior brick chimney to the west and a gable roof covered with corrugated metal.

The Waters house is a large vernacular farmhouse which was built in parts. The main block of the house reflects its early twentieth century date of construction. Uninfluenced by the late nineteenth century Victorian styles, as are many of the other farmhouses in the area, the house is more functional then decorative in design as was the trend during this time. The porch that surrounds two sides of the house, for example, is supported by heavy, slightly tapered columns instead of the delicate victorian turned posts. In addition, the house is very limited in its architectual ornamentation. This section of the house wasadded about 1920 to the original Waters farmhouse which supposedly dates from the 1850's or early 1860's.1

The main block of the house, circa. 1920, was probably built by Zachariah McCubbin Waters, Jr. Zachariah, Sr. recieved the property which included the early dwelling in 1895 from the heirs of James M. Waters. The property was originally owned by Zachariah's parents, Nathaniel M. and Achsa Waters (who died in 1863 and 1856 respectively). The farm remained in the Waters family for many years. Zacharaih, Jr. lived here with his wife, Susie, and their four children until his death in 1940.3 The farm was then sold out of the family. It passed through a succession of owners until it was purchased by the present owners, Donald and Genevieve Fagan in July of 1968.4 The Fagans have since added on a new kitchen with a bedroom over it, to the rear of the house.5

Also, of particular interest on the property is a small log house which is said to have been a Waters residence before the construction of the present dwelling. The log house has been moved from its original location on the farm. It has been restored and is now in very good condition.



I received your letter dated March 12, 2004 concerning the Montgomery County Historic Preservation Commission's ("HPC") intent to hold a public hearing on April 13, 2004 to evaluate the historic and architectural significance of certain properties, including my residence at the referenced address. As I do not believe my residence warrants or meets the criteria for having either historical, archeological, architectural or cultural value within the Maryland-Washington Regional District, I wanted to provide the following information and comments:

In the Preliminary Draft Amendment to the Master Plan for Historic Preservation dated March 2004 ("Preliminary Draft") provided in the materials you sent, my residence is described in the following manner:

"This property may include three generations of dwellings of the Waters family. The log structure is said to have been the first dwelling on this farmstead. The rear section of the house dates from the mid 19th century, and the front block from c1920. Zachariah MacCubbin Waters married Sarah Magruder in 1859. Their son, Zac Jr. married Susie Davis in 1897. Zac's parents Nathaniel and Achsah Waters married 1809, and died 1865 and 1872. A one-level barn (c1900) has concrete floor and wire nails, and contains granary, box stalls, and corn crib. Also on site are a smokehouse and woodshed.

For purposes of convenience, I address my response consistent with the principal representations in the Preliminary Draft.

I. THIS PROPERTY MAY INCLUDE THREE GENERATIONS OF DWELLINGS OF THE WATERS FAMILY.

There is no evidence that three generations of the Waters family resided in the residence. Furthermore, and despite the fact that to my understanding the actual Waters decedents referenced in the Preliminary Draft did not in any manner influence society or otherwise have any historic significance to the area, one of the recognized considerations for historical preservation of a property, there is no direct evidence that they ever even actually lived in the house.

II. THE LOG STRUCTURE IS SAID TO HAVE BEEN THE FIRST DWELLING ON THIS FARMSTEAD.

First and foremost, and before addressing any historical significance, the log house is structurally beyond reasonable repair. Namely, the original roof has long since deteriorated and was replaced with a modern metal roof which itself is in need of replacement. New doors and windows and electric and water were added approximately 20 years ago which have since either rotted or no longer work and which are also in need of replacement. However, even if such repairs were financially practical, the house is collapsing and I had to hire a contractor to shore it up internally by using numerous wood supports as the walls themselves rotted beyond repair and are leaning in. In certain places, the wood has been replaced with sheets of plywood. Every piece of wood has been infested and shows rabid termite damage and the modern concrete that was used to stand between the wood has crumbled and, in certain sections, the wall has actually fallen away. Upon buying the house, I had two contractors inspect the log house to see if it was possible to repair such and bring it within Maryland Code for purposes of a separate living quarter. Both advised that the property could not be brought to Code much less even repaired – at any reasonable cost – in that the logs are not salvageable and that the roof, windows, and doors - although not part of the original structure - also are not salvageable and that instead an entire new structure would have to be built on the spot. In short, the log structure cannot be salvaged. Instead, all new walls would have to be added and a new roof and new windows and doors. As such, northing of whatever previously existed would remain.

As for any potential historical significance of the building, there is no record of when the building was actually constructed. However, the previous occupants of the property advised that a new foundation with a fireplace was built during the last 50 years (as such is evidenced by more modern concrete and construction in both the foundation and between the logs on the walls) and the cabin was "moved" to sit on top of such foundation. Again, the foundation itself is not historic in that it was built to act as a foundation for the cabin by one of the previous occupants.

III. THE REAR SECTION OF THE HOUSE DATES FROM THE MID 19TH CENTURY, AND THE FRONT BLOCK FROM C1920

There is no evidence that the current house dated from the mid 19th Century. The house itself has been dated by various contractors as likely constructed in the early part of the 1900s with additions dating through to the 1970s. The house has gone through

numerous repairs and renovations during the last 50 years which itself embodies the current distinctive character of the look of the house. Namely, the house has been constructed and repeatedly renovated to maintain the appearance of a colonial style house – whereas in actuality, it was by design of the owners—not maintenance of a pre-existing structure or look. During the last 50 years, the exterior of the property has been subject, by way of example, to the following:

- 1. The construction of a 5 bay car garage (c 1970);
- 2. The construction of a wrap around porch (c2001);
- 3. The construction of a screened in porch (c1970);
- 4. The addition of an inground swimming pool (1970s and 2001);
- 5. The addition of new windows and doors (c2002);
- 6. The addition of new roofing on the house and garage (c2000);
- 7. The construction of a rear porch (c2003);
- 8. The addition of aluminum siding (1970);
- 9. The addition of outside lighting and post lamps (c2002); and
- 10. The construction of a rear addition to the house incorporating a laundry room, bathroom and kitchen. (c1970).

In short, the construction, including the construction that my family and the previous occupants added, have resulted in the total cannibalization of the entire original exterior appearance of the property that may have existed before the 1970s and, although such was done to portray an old colonial style, such was nevertheless done by design of the respective owners to create an appearance. Again, such construction occurred in the 1970s and 1990s – not the 1870s or 1890s. Where, in actuality, even if ever an older house could have existed – it has since ago either been torn down or consumed by the present existing structure. As such, the current house – and specifically its exterior distinctive appearance – does have any historic significance in that such distinctive appearance was "manufactured" during the last 30 years – not the last 100.

IV. ON SITE ARE A SMOKEHOUSE AND WOODSHED.

The residence does not maintain a smoke house. Namely, among other things, the toolshed has slats of wood with top-to-bottom vertical one inch spacing which in itself would render it ineffective for a smoke house. Further, there is no residual of any form of charring or the smell of smoking in the toolshed as can often be found with remnants of other preserved smoke houses. Further, the structure itself maintains a recently constructed cement base with a new construction tin roof and ventilation slats on each side that were purchased and then painted to resemble an old style—I know, because I personally purchased and installed the roof and slats myself and painted the structure 5 years ago. In short, as with the primary house, it has been manufactured to capture the old style of a colonial style house without actually holding any historic value. As for the woodshed, I doubt any significance can be placed on the structure as it does not represent any significant distinctive characteristic. Namely, the small three sided structure boasts a remnant metal roof and the wood sides appear to have been made from remnants of wood

during the last 20-40 years. Indeed one wall boasts a wall made of shingles which I replaced with remnants from some wood I found in the barn over 3 years ago.

Based on the foregoing, I believe neither the toolshed or woodshed could reasonably be considered eligible for any form of historic preservation.

I hope the foregoing assists you in your review of this matter and has supported that my residence does not warrant listing as a historical property. If you should determine otherwise, please advise so that I make take appropriate action. Please direct any correspondence in this matter to my direct attention.

According to Waters' family history, a William Waters lived on 299 acres in Germantown in 1789.





Dear Property Owner,

Historic preservation planning staff is beginning the evaluation of historic resources in the Goshen-Damascus area. The historic evaluation of these properties is taking place at this time because of the upcoming update of the Damascus Area Master Plan that is scheduled to begin in the next year.

Records indicate that you are the owner of the Waters House, at 9601 Huntmaster Road (Resource #14/44). Your property was identified on the 1976 Locational Atlas and Index of Historic Sites as being of potential historic significance, or was noted by planning staff as being of potential historic merit. Staff will be visiting each of the 60 sites under consideration, to document the property with photographs. If you would like us to make an appointment with you for this site visit, please call our office at 301-563-3400.

Evaluation of historic resources is a careful process, as the enclosed chart reveals. The Historic Preservation Commission, Planning Board, and County Council review each property, evaluating every proposed designation to see whether it meets Historic Preservation Ordinance criteria for historic or architectural significance that would warrant its protection. Each reviewing body holds public hearings, with the County Council having the final say on all designations. Not all nominated properties are designated. Over 425 resources have been found to be ineligible for designation are have been removed from the *Locational Atlas*. The entire evaluation process typically takes about one year.

Historic designation helps to manage change, so that new construction or landscaping is accomplished in sympathy to the historic character of a property. The enclosed brochure explains in more detail the effects of designation, including tax credits that are available for restoration work.

Site visits and photographic documentation are the first step in researching historic properties. Staff will also be consulting land records, tax assessments, family histories, and other documents. Staff will summarize findings in a Maryland Historical Trust inventory form for each property. - I. Outstanding resource architecturally and/or historically. Most resources in Category I either maintain the highest level of integrity or are invaluable as ruinous evidence of former significant structures. Should be evaluated immediately for Master Plan designation.
- II. Very good resource architecturally and/or historically. Most resources in Category II maintain their basic integrity. Should be evaluated promptly for Master Plan designation.
- III. Good resource architecturally and/or historically. Some resources in Category III have a diminished level of integrity. Should be evaluated for Master Plan designation, but with lower priority.
- IV. Marginal resource. Falls into one or more of the following categories: 1) severely deteriorated, 2) heavily altered, 3) architectural character not strong, 4) historical significance not apparent, 5) only typical of a large number of comparable resources. Lowest priority for evaluation for Master Plan designation.
- V. Resource which is either demolished or which could not be located based on information given on survey form. Remove demolished structures from Locational Atlas and, if after further study the resources not located to date cannot be located, remove from Locational Atlas.
- VI. Resource was inaccessible at time of survey.
